The Clearface font was originally designed by Morris F. Benton in 1910. In 1978 Victor Caruso was licensed by ATF to develop an antique typeface and matching italic, both based on the forms of Clearface Gothic. The result was ITC Clearface, a serif typeface with marked stroke contrast and italic weights. The teardrop-formed endings of the lowercase a, c and f (also found in Caslon) define the character of the typeface. The ITC Clearface font is good for both texts and headlines. It is distinguished by its small, almost slab, serifs, a large x-height and very little stroke contrast. The slightly condensed ITC Clearface font is at its best when it is allowed lots of space.

This was a project in Mrs. Lock's class also; it was about a typeface we picked out of a hat. We had to research it and display it in the monograph in an informative and functional manner. Clearface is now one of my favorite typefaces.


