

Instructions

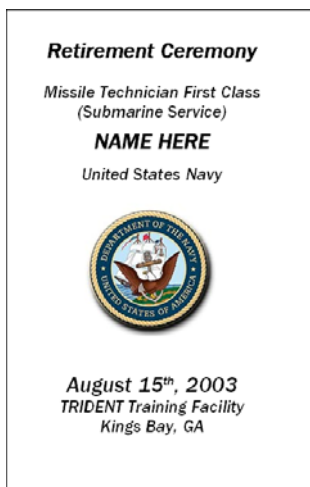
1. Let your command know you are ready to retire at least a year early.
2. Inform the Command Career Counselor (CCC) also a year early. He has to do some paperwork, send off a message, and get you in TAP class.
3. Select a sponsor or retirement coordinator (or both). This will be the individual(s) that should do all the leg work for you. For example, selecting young strong men to move tables and bring the beer at your retirement ceremony. Also your coordinator or sponsor will answer to the Chief of the Boat (COB) or Executive Officer (XO) regarding details and the timeline for getting things completed on schedule.
4. You may also want to get a one year subscription to G.I. Jobs magazine. There is a lot of good information in their magazine about your transition to the civilian world.

Ceremony Program/Bulletin

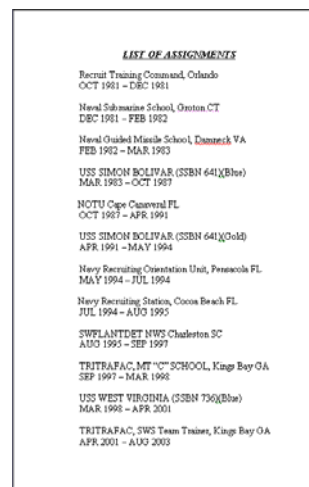
Here is a sample Retirement program/bulletin to provide you with inspiration. But you can change it anyway you like. It is YOUR ceremony.

The Submariner
