Battle in Portugal The forces of Spain, in a surprise move, have attacked the kingdom of Portugal. Trouble in the new World

On a related note, the diplomatic discourse between the Court of St. James and the Escorial about new world issues have sunk to a new low. With Minister Zorro calling English settlers "trailer trash" and the English accusing the Spanish of " raids [that] have burned three trailer parks in the crown

colony of Georgia. Estimated damage: £2, 3s, 2d". That about enough to buy a small schnitzel and a Wiessbier in local currency, which just goes to show the paucity of goodwill in international relations. Now the Spanish claim they have captured English Spies in he Carib bean, fomenting well deserved unrest in Santo Domingo. The return of the Old Worlds wars to the New is only a matter of time.

News from St. Petersburg. In an uncommon flurry of communication, the Tsarina's court seems to be trying to make itself more accessible to the west, as well as indulge in some well placed propaganda. Among the releases to the world's press: MILITARY MYSTERY MUDDLES Moscow "In the present climate of increased tension

Some observers note with approval the Prince's extensive resume, including a brief period in the senior echelons of the Prussian military service. The Treaty of Hamburg

The northern powers, England, Prussia and Norway, have signed a treaty in Hamburg. Details of the treaty are mostly secret. The only clause to be released to the public was the first. This is very brief and to the point, reading: Article One: Sweden, Prussia and England (Hanover) enter into a treaty of non aggression with each other. From the size of the final document. and the length of the signing ceremony, experienced observers are in no doubt that there is more to the treaty than just that. Dip-Iomatic reaction among the participants was positive (surprise!). The English were unavailable for comment, but Count Podwiels stated that the Prussians agreed to the treaty as originally proposed,

## Other European Events.
