
St. Robert and Waynesville both have a rich history featuring Route 66, the Trail of Tears and the Civil War. The influence of the railroad can be



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# Experience the Charm of the Ozarks

n 1833 pioneers were migrating west. The beauty and opportunity that rested in the Lopen rivers and streams, wooded forests, and abundant wildlife of central Missouri attracted early travelers. Modern-day travelers are drawn for many of the same reasons. In the heart of Missouri, Pulaski County affords the opportunity to escape the hustle and bustle of modern-day life to glimpse a simpler time. Looking for a bit of history? We've got that. How about history in the making? No problem. Have a passion for outdoor adventure? Give us a real challenge! Golf? Fishing? Spelunking? Pulaski County has something for everyone.

As summer's warmth folds into the brilliant fall foliage, possibilities in Pulaski County thrive. Summer festivals, carnivals, community parks and access to some of America's favorite outdoor escapes — reasons abound that beckon visitors from around the world. Charming Midwestern towns, breathtaking scenery, outdoor adventure and echoes of history invite travelers throughout the year to linger in the Ozark landscape. Whether you enjoy admiring a stunning sunset or exploring history in a museum, Pulaski County has something for everyone.

Much of Pulaski County's charm rests with its link to a younger America. As stagecoaches made way for railroads and the Wire Road faded under the construction of Route 66, Pulaski County witnessed history and the rise of the Midwest. The Cherokee traversed the area in 1838 on the grueling trek to Oklahoma that would become known as

the Trail of Tears. The Civil War was the backdrop against which Pulaski County witnessed neighbor fight against neighbor, while the Union Army built a fort in Waynesville and Confederate militias patrolled the woods. Railroads boomed and faded, planting the foundations for Crocker, Dixon and Richland. World War II introduced the construction of Fort Leonard Wood, through which passed infantry troops bound for Europe as well as German and Italian POWs. The post has since supported and trained military personnel for every U.S. war; the re-establishment of the post after a brief deactivation led to the boom of the neighboring community, St. Robert. Present-day St. Robert has grown to be the economic center of Pulaski County.

As America moves into the next century, Pulaski County still preserves and honors its history, yet itself is witness to history in the making. A tour of the county reveals unique relics and museums; a chat with a local resident will illustrate enchanting folklore of days past. Escape the frantic pace of the Interstate to relax on Route 66, where a winding country drive will remind you of the good old days. Neighboring Fort Leonard Wood stands proud as the launching ground for thousands of military careers.

Outdoor lovers won't be disappointed. The Ozark landscape of Pulaski County is

unique in its rolling hills, dramatic caves, abundant wildlife and winding rivers. Take your pick from the Roubidoux, Gasconade or Big Piney rivers. Spend an afternoon fishing, hunting, camping or cavediving. The area is home to world-renowned fishing and canoeing. Its hiking trails and community parks are ideal, whether you want a rugged challenge or a leisurely walk. Sports enthusiasts — we've got what you're looking for, too. Multi-purpose fields for soccer, rugby, field hockey and lacrosse exist side by side with volleyball courts, softball fields, swimming pools, tennis courts and horseshoe pits. Pulaski County is also a popular geocaching location, concealing almost 40 caches.

Every city has its own charm, and the communities of Pulaski County are no exception. Blossoming and thriving St. Robert, historic Waynesville, and proud Fort Leonard Wood complement the beauty of Richland and the railroad history of Crocker and Dixon. Perhaps most central to the heart of the county is its people. Friendliness and hospitality overflow throughout the city festivals and community events or with a neighborly wave on the street.

Don't miss Pulaski County's miles of waterways, caves, mills and springs, history, and Midwestern charm.



# Each Community Holds a Unique Charm

### **CROCKER:** REMEMBERING THE RAILROADS

The days when railroads ruled America may have gone the way of the steam engine, but the town of Crocker preserves its railroad history with pride. This cozy city, surrounded by forested hills and rolling farms in the heart of the Ozarks, affords visitors a unique look at a historic railroad town known for its community values and hospitality.

From the railroad tracks that date back to the Frisco Railroad to the red caboose that resides in the heart of town, Crocker embraces its rail roots. What began as a small trading post in the 1800s has grown to be a charming Midwestern town surrounded by the Ozark hills and meandering Gasconade River. Crocker's history isn't limited to the railroads, however; the James Gang, the notorious band of criminals who frequently robbed stagecoaches, trains and banks, once traveled the area regularly. Rumor has it that Jesse James had a cousin who lived in town.

Railroad enthusiasts, history buffs and those who are simply curious are drawn to Crocker's Depot Museum and Norma Lea Frisco Park. The depot was the last in Pulaski County and served as the mail pick-up and drop-off point for the rest of the county. Now a museum, the original structure is home not only to county antiques, photographs and old train logs, but also to warm memories. Some still recall time spent by the potbelly

stove awaiting the next train that would bring friends and family. After you've lingered over the depot's relics, head out to Frisco Park to visit the Frisco Railroad caboose.

Crocker boasts another park as well, complete with soccer and softball fields; a swimming pool; a lake for fishing, surrounded by a walking trail; and picnic areas with a pavilion. Indulge on a warm afternoon with an escape to our native wildflower prairie. The peaceful meadow is the habitat for a variety of native wildflowers; birds, ducks and geese join visitors in the relaxing environment. Even a blue heron stops occasionally for a visit.

Of course, it's the people that give a town its character, and Crocker is no exception. Residents pride themselves on their closely held values of faith, patriotism and community. The city park is home to Railroad Days each Labor Day weekend, and visitors can't help but be charmed by this growing community. Plus, Crocker is easily accessible from local highways, making it the perfect day trip.

From the days of the Depression, when teachers volunteered to teach without pay, to the 1940s, when residents housed construction workers from Fort Leonard Wood, Crocker has earned its reputation as a warm, welcoming community. Crocker extends its characteristic hospitality and encourages you to tour its historic landmarks or take a scenic drive to visit the local parks.

### **DIXON: A PANORAMIC VIEW**

It may be a small town, but Dixon knows how to attract attention. Looking for the perfect day trip to gain a little relaxation or perspective? Why not try a scenic overlook that attracts artists, photographers and nature lovers? Maybe you're in the mood for golf, or want to unwind on a trip down the Gasconade River. Your refuge lies just north of Interstate 44, where Dixon blends nature's beauty, outdoor recreation and a welcoming community. It began as a railroad boomtown on the Frisco Railroad; as the railroad faded, it became a cozy Midwestern city known for its miles of scenic views and small-town hospitality and friendliness.

Dixon is home to some of Pulaski County's best camping, whether you're pitching a tent or own an RV. Soak up the sun on the Gasconade River as you paddle its waters in a canoe. Golfers can work on their handicap on the beautiful nine-hole golf course. Dixon's beauty will capture visitors no matter the season. Warm summer breezes on the Gasconade and the vibrant red and orange hues of autumn captivate visitors and bring out the nature lover in everyone.

An afternoon at Portuguese Point provides an extraordinary view of the Missouri landscape. Formed by two large rock formations 400 feet above the Gasconade River, the surrounding valley that once provided land for Portuguese cattle and sheep farmers is

now an inspiring perspective for artists and photographers. Enjoy the view with a steak or a glass of Missouri wine at The Point Steakhouse, where window seating offers a panoramic view of Portuguese Point.

If you're fortunate enough to be in town during one of our annual festivals, stop by and see why Dixon's hospitality is unparalleled. Feel lucky? Test your luck to win a cow at the Dixon Cow Days Festival, or put on your dancing shoes and join the fun at the Dixon Blue Grass Music Festival.

While you're in town, be sure to browse through the antique shops or visit local berry and pumpkin farms for your pick of seasonal fruits and vegetables.

No matter how you spend your time, you're sure to leave with the one-of-a-kind perspective and contentment only Dixon's hometown atmosphere can provide.

### RICHLAND: THE PERFECT ESCAPE

In 1869, when a railroad surveyor noticed the potential in a small area between Springfield and St. Louis, he undoubtedly had his eye on the miles of sprawling hills, the sparkling Gasconade River and the acres of green forest. The town of Richland sprang up along the Frisco Railroad and became a livestock production and farming community. Today, Richland still promises miles of scenic beauty and Midwestern charm to refresh your spirit and satisfy all of your outdoor aspirations.

Tucked in Missouri's Ozark region just minutes off Interstate 44, Richland's appeal lies in its small-town, family atmosphere; connection to outdoor adventure; and beautiful parks.

Richland's proximity to local highways makes it a short driving distance to major shopping malls and facilities, resort communities, and several Missouri state colleges and universities.

A day at Shady Dell Park will entertain and captivate any crowd, whether it's a company picnic or an afternoon with the family. Located in the heart of town, this 20-acre park is home to covered picnic pavilions, playgrounds, sand volleyball courts, a horseshoe pitching area, tennis courts and an Olympic-sized swimming pool. If you're in the neighborhood, join us for the annual Tri-County Fair, held at the park. Concerts and a carnival provide a festive backdrop for crafts, truck and tractor pulls, kids' contests, and Missouri's best barbecue.

Love to golf? Test your skill at our ninehole community golf course. If you're eager for adventure of a different nature, head out to the Gasconade River. Thirty miles of clear water winds its way around Richland to provide some of Missouri's best bass fishing. Round up some friends and paddle down the river in a canoe, or pitch a tent and spend the night in Mark Twain National Forest.

The average traveler has probably never eaten dinner in a cave. In Richland, you can finish your day with dinner in one of our historic caves at the nationally famous Caveman BBO and Steakhouse.

Like many towns in Pulaski County, Richland traces much of its history to the railroads. Long ago, the railroad gave Richland the boost it needed to establish its roots as a cornerstone of Pulaski County. By 1877 it was a major shipping point between Springfield and St. Louis. The railroad also provided local farmers the opportunity to earn extra money by cutting lumber for railroad ties. Today, Richland invites visitors who want to revel in the outdoor escapes, linger in beautiful parks or take advantage of the easy access to Missouri's best. Rekindle your love of the outdoors and recharge your batteries, and discover why Richland is the perfect escape.

underwater caves to beautiful parks, from modern-day excitement to echoes of the past.

The giant Frog Rock, W.H. Croaker, greets visitors as they arrive in downtown Waynesville. The huge painted rock is a Waynesville landmark that hints to visitors they've entered a city with a personality all its own.

Consider yourself a history buff? With a namesake like Revolutionary War hero "Mad Anthony" Wayne, Waynesville is as rich in history as its name suggests. One of the oldest cities in Pulaski County, it has been a trading post for trappers and pioneers, a rest stop for stagecoaches traveling west, and an encampment for the infamous Trail of Tears. It has hosted battles and skirmishes in the Civil War and established its popularity with travelers and day-trippers alike with the development of Route 66. Waynesville's history is immortalized in several downtown buildings; a marker on Fort Street indicates the site of a Civil War Union fort.

Take the trip back in time to visit Waynesville's historic downtown square. The site of the Old Courthouse Museum has housed the Pulaski County Courthouse since 1837; the current structure was built in 1903. This is one of the few remaining courthouses that sits directly on Route 66.

An original courtroom is available for tours, and visitors can linger over memorabilia from county history.

The Old Stagecoach Shop is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and was built in the late 1850s. The original structure has a storied and varied history, having served as a post office and stagecoach stop for pioneers journeying the Springfield to St. Louis Wire Road, as a tavern, as a dental office, as a hospital for injured soldiers during the Civil War, as a hotel, and as a private residence.

If modern-day fun holds more appeal, spend the day at beautiful Roubidoux Spring to experience the area's best trout fishing at one of the few urban trout streams. The famous spring is also home to an underwater cave that draws certified cave divers from around the globe. In 1837, the spring was a site along the infamous Trail of Tears during the Cherokee removal.

Take an afternoon stroll on the walking trail that joins Waynesville and Laughlin Park for a refreshing tour along the Roubidoux River, or gather the family for a picnic in one of the pavilions to please any crowd.


Whether you're fishing, enjoying walking trails or taking advantage of the short distance to Pulaski County's finest camping and


canoeing, Waynesville is sure to offer activities for any interest.

# PRESERVING AND CELEBRATING **OUR MILITARY HERITAGE**

It's no surprise that Fort Leonard Wood has devoted significant effort to honoring military history and heritage - after all, units and personnel from the Army post have deployed to aid every major U.S. military action and peacekeeping effort since World War II. With its state-of-the-art technology and training, Fort Leonard Wood leads the way to the

future while preserving the proud history of the U.S. military. Fort Leonard Wood is home to museums, memorials and historic attractions that stir patriotism in all of us.

Perhaps the most prominent is the John B. Mahaffey Museum Complex. Attracting over 100,000 visitors each year, the complex houses museums dedicated to preserving the history of Fort Leonard Wood, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the Military Police Corps and the Chemical Corps. The museums combine vivid, life-size exhibits and authentic relics, including old weaponry, documents, vehicles and tools from all American military conflicts.

The Fort Leonard Wood Museum captivates visitors at its World War II Compound. The compound is a grouping of original barracks built from December 1940 through May 1941. Designed to be temporary structures, the buildings were built at a rate of one every 45 minutes. The museum also shows descriptions of life on the post dating back to the early 1940s. Additionally, the museum pays tribute to the career of the post's namesake, Gen. Leonard Wood, whose career highlights include being the first commander of the Rough Riders (yep, he's Theodore Roosevelt's predecessor) and his appointment as the Army Chief of Staff.

Did you know that Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee was an army engineer? The Engineer Museum is full of surprises for visitors, who can wander through the bridging gallery and tour a special weapons room. Visitors will also appreciate the amphibious exhibits and detailed land mine warfare and demolitions exhibits.

The Chemical Corps Museum will interest anyone captivated by recent newspaper headlines that describe future warfare. Museum exhibits trace the progression of the Army's

### A VITAL NATIONAL **AND COMMUNITY MISSION**

With its main gate bordering St. Robert, Fort Leonard Wood has become both an integral part of Pulaski County and an active supporter of the surrounding communities. Since its construction in late 1940, the post has become renowned for stateof-the-art training and support of national defense and has served as the launching point for millions of military careers. Fort Leonard Wood has rapidly grown as a training center, as a community and as a partner with Pulaski County.

The post is home to the Engineer, Chemical and Military Police corps training schools as well as personnel from all branches of the U.S. Military. In fact, the largest Marine detachment not stationed at a Marine base is stationed at Fort Leonard Wood. The post is also home to the U.S. Army Maneuver Support Center (MANSCEN), which develops concepts, doctrine, force structure and material requirements to ensure the vitality of the Engineer, Chemical and Military Police schools.

Construction for the post began in December 1940 and, by the following May, the complex already had over 1,600 temporary buildings. Its original mission as a basic training center began in World War II when five infantry divisions prepared for battle here. Additionally, over 5,000 POWs were detained here to work in agriculture and construction. Since World War II, Fort Leonard Wood

# **American Awards**

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The distinguished Military Police Corps traces its proud history in a museum that displays hundreds of artifacts and amazing exhibits. The museum is notable for its first-hand descriptions of battles, soldier experiences and historic photographs. Civil War uniforms, disciplinary barracks and prison models, historic vehicles, and modern-day military police exhibits offer visitors the chance to glimpse the life of the military police.

Museums are only the beginning of Fort Leonard Wood's attractions, where historic buildings are set against a natural landscape abundant with hiking trails, caves and waters for fishing and boating.

Some of Fort Leonard Wood's most popular sites are highlighted on the post driving tour. Several buildings along the tour date back to the origins of Fort Leonard Wood and contain interesting bits of history. The Black Officer's Club was built in 1941 and houses a restored mural that was painted by SSG Samuel Countee in 1945. Like many of the post structures, the Ike Skelton House was also constructed in 1941 as the post's Red Cross Office. The original structure still stands and is now used as VIP Guest Quarters. Other original structures along the route include the old post headquarters and the Garlington House. Another structural highlight is the Rolling Heath Schoolhouse, which dates back to 1912.

In addition to historic buildings, the driving tour shows off Fort Leonard Wood's geographic uniqueness. The impressive Miller Cave is one of the area's largest caves and once served as a prehistoric Native American shelter. Or, visit Stone Mill Spring, where over 18 million gallons of water flow daily. The spring was once home to a historic mill dating back to the 1840s.

Fort Leonard Wood also pays homage to U.S. military heroes at several memorial sites, including Veterans Memorial Park and Memorial Grove and Park.

The Piney Valley Golf Course promises a challenging game of golf against the beautiful Piney Valley landscape. The 18-hole course is open to the public, year-round.

No matter your mission, a day at Fort Leonard promises a link to our country's heritage and a tour that will rank above any other.



# Conflict in the Midwest

The battle lines had been drawn, and Americans picked up their weapons. The Civil War was about to change the face of the nation as they knew it. Most of us are familiar with the battle that raged on the East Coast, but what about the Midwest? Few realize the impact the Civil War had on both historic and present-day Pulaski County.

While alliances were mostly clear in the East, loyalties were much hazier in Pulaski County. Missouri was Confederate territory and, indeed, Waynesville initially flew the Confederate flag. The rugged terrain and relative isolation of the Missouri frontier shielded locals from strong opinions for or against slavery, however, and secession from the Union held little immediate consequence. As debate raged in the young country, the prevalent support in Pulaski County remained with the South; the presidential election of 1860 yielded only seven votes for Abraham Lincoln to John Breckenridge's 281. As war became imminent, however, opinions began to shift, and this trend continued throughout the war. In Pulaski County, neighbors, families and friends found themselves on opposite sides of the battlefield.

It soon became clear that the key supply road from St. Louis to Springfield would be critical to either side's success, placing Pulaski County as a main thoroughfare. What is now Route 66 was, at the time, a path for transporting troops and supplies for each army; the Union Army eventually strung a telegraph wire along the route, resulting in its nickname of "The Wire Road."

Many Pulaski County farmers joined either the Union Army or Confederate militias or guerilla groups, and by 1862, Waynesville had become the center of the war in Pulaski County. While a few women remained to support local fighters, most fled with their children to safer territory. Union soldiers took over the town and erected a large fort on Fort Street, overlooking the downtown square. A marker at the site is now all that remains of the fort. The Pulaski County Courthouse was so badly damaged by rifle fire that it had to be torn down in 1870. The stagecoach stop, which still stands as The Old Stagecoach Stop museum in downtown Waynesville, was converted to a hospital for wounded soldiers.

As Union forces patrolled the streets, the wilderness was alive with Confederate militias that ambushed supply wagons. Pulaski County's rugged terrain and numerous caves changed the face of battle from traditional fighting methods to brief clashes between armies. The area was host to bloody skirmishes and raids.

By the time Union troops left Waynesville in 1865, Pulaski County was deserted. Some estimates maintain that up to 75 percent of the population had left. Homes and farms were vacant. Buildings were looted and destroyed; livestock was gone, and farms were overgrown. Many citizens never returned; for a time the Ozark region remained dangerous territory.

Fortunately, word of land ownership opportunity traveled east. Southerners who had lost their homes in the war seized the opportunity and headed west to establish new roots. The Southern Pacific Railroad opened rail lines to Springfield, giving rise to numerous small towns along the tracks, opening new economic possibility and establishing much of modern-day Pulaski County.

History has not been forgotten. Pulaski County still holds many remnants of the Civil War, allowing glimpses into our rich past. Two markers indicate areas of interest from the battles. The Old Courthouse Museum holds many relics from county history; the Old Stagecoach Stop features a Civil War medical display as well as artifacts from local history. The original structure still stands as a testament to the ties that bind modern-day Pulaski County with memories of the past.











# Get Your Kicks in Pulaski County

t's undergone many transformations and is known by L many names, but most of us have heard of Route 66. You've heard you can "get your kicks on Route 66," but what does that really mean? If you're traveling the 300 miles of highway that spans 10 counties in Missouri, it means tearing a page out of history as you travel through quaint towns that provide glimpses to, and even memories of, a younger America.

The stretch of Route 66 that winds through Pulaski County is lush with brilliant scenery and breathtaking landscapes. Valleys cut through limestone and dolomite rock, and

you'll visit cities whose heyday was years ago, as well as cities just finding their roots. The tour will captivate travelers as they wind along the historic road in Pulaski County. Take your time to experience what a 1930 tourist map describes as "a glorious panorama, whose grandeur is unrivaled in America."



Migrating mastodon once traveled a track that was later a pathway for Indians. The natural thoroughfare was a key supply route for soldiers and materials during the Civil War, and later, the Union Army strung a telegraph line along the road — the origin of the nickname "The Wire Road." The road also served as the main passage from St. Louis to Springfield. The staying power of the route was solidified in 1926, when a 2,400-mile road that would stretch from Chicago, Illinois, to Santa Monica, California, was commissioned. The road would become Route 66 as we know it

The route through Pulaski County holds particular appeal for modern-day travelers, with its blend of historic landmarks and



natural preservation.

Scenic overlooks and rivers are interspersed with historic buildings. Still visible is the historic Hooker Church and Graveyard, which dates back to the early 1900s. As you travel through Hooker Cut, take in the popular postcard landscape that was once rumored to be the deepest road cut in America and that shows the layers of limestone that had to be overcome to build the road.

Travel through the beautiful hamlet of Devil's Elbow and find out why lumberjacks cried in frustration at a large boulder lodged in the sharpest bend in the Big Piney River. They reasoned the boulder could only have been put there by the devil — the boulder and sharp corner caught the logs they tried to float downriver and created work-stopping logiams. Stop for lunch in Devil's Elbow. Continue to Waynesville, the only downtown area on Route 66 in Missouri, where the historic Old Stagecoach Stop has stood since the 1850s. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the building has served as a stagecoach stop, private residence, post office and Civil War hospital. While you're in the neighborhood, stop by the Old Courthouse Museum, which still houses one of its original 1903 courtrooms.

This historic road was once home to homemade Ozark basket shops, tourist courts (early motels) and a hillbilly store. It has opened the highways of America and opened a passage to the West. Today, it is a perfect afternoon drive that promises natural beauty, preserved history and landmarks, and scenic overlooks.



 $\mathbf{7}$ e'd call it a hideaway if it weren't so easy to find. Centrally located along Interstate 44, Pulaski County is a short drive from St. Louis, Kansas City and Branson and is only an hour from other enjoyable attractions, including the St. James Winery region, the Osage Beach Outlet Mall and the Bass Pro Headquarters in Springfield, Missouri.

Pulaski County offers many activities. Follow the Trail of Tears, visit one of the many Civil War sites or take a Railroad Driving Tour. Or, get your kicks on historic Route 66, where

you can visit Hooker Pass or Devil's Elbow. Antique shops and flea markets abound, providing opportunities to treasure hunt. See history in the making and history preserved at Fort Leonard Wood, home to the Mahaffey Museum Complex, which tells the fascinating stories of the Army's Engineering, Chemical Warfare and Military Police schools.

### DAY TRIPS AND DRIVING TOURS

Pulaski County offers many driving tours with breathtaking views of the limestone cliffs and meandering rivers of the Ozarks.

Retrace the growth of the railroad and see the influence it had on the communities it created. Find a treasure or unique gift with a tour of the many antique shops and flea markets. Take a historical driving tour of Fort Leonard Wood and see the original buildings, including the Ike Skelton House and the Black Officer's Club, plus natural resources at Miller Cave and Stone Mill Spring. Stop at the Mahaffey Museum Complex. Or get your kicks on Route 66.

Stop by the Visitors Center and pick up one of our many driving tour brochures.

he Pulaski County Tourism Bureau began as a vision of community leaders to establish an organization to market the attributes of the county and shift some reliance for economic support from Fort Leonard Wood to tourism. A ballot was presented to the voters in 1998 asking them to approve a transient guest tax of 3 percent on lodging sales in the county. The ballot was approved, and the Tourism Bureau was created to over-

see the distribution of collected funds for the purpose of marketing the attractions and natural resources of Pulaski County.

The Tourism Bureau consists of a nine-member Board of Directors who are representative of the County. Each of the incorporated communities nominates someone from its Chamber of Commerce. Lodging, restaurant and outfitters businesses receive a nomination, and the Board chooses a

local businessperson who has an interest in tourism.

The Pulaski County Tourism Bureau opened the Pulaski County Visitor Center in St. Robert in 2001. The Visitor Center operates year-round and distributes free brochures from all over the state of Missouri to visitors and residents alike. The Visitor Center also serves as a central hub for groups to host registrations and tours to meet their Army escort.

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
