less you have a mentor such as Ron Harrison."

Harrison is also cited for his activities on behalf of many organizations and in the community. He is the immediate past chairperson of the International Franchise Association (IFA) and past chairperson of IFA's Educational Foundation. He is a member of IFA's executive committee as well as the minorities in franchising committee; past chairperson of the Business Policy Review Council and immediate past chairperson of the Business Consortium Fund, a \$20 million fund for minority suppliers.

He is an active leader on the corporate advisory boards of the Congressional Black Caucus, the U.S. Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, the National Council of La Raza, the National Urban League and the National Puerto Rican Coalition. He is the co-chair of the corporate advisory board of the Cuban American National Council and is the incoming chairperson of the National Puerto Rican Coalition's corporate advisory board. He has served as a board member and trustee of the National Hispanic Corporate Council, the Executive Leadership Council and Foundation, the IFA, the Cuban American National Council and the College of New Rochelle.

According to Rouse, Harrison's heart is in helping other people. "You have to meet Ron Harrison to understand why."
