**Feast of the Dedication of the
Lateran Basilica**

Theme: Jesus was speaking about the temple of his body.

Breaking Open the Word Suggested text for faith sharing: Gospel from John 2:13-22

Since the Passover of the Jews was near, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. He found in the temple area those who sold oxen, sheep, and doves, as well as the money-changers seated there. He made a whip out of cords and drove them all out of the temple area, with the sheep and oxen, and spilled the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables, and to those who sold doves he said, "Take these out of here, and stop making my Father's house a marketplace." His disciples recalled the words of Scripture, Zeal for your house will consume me. At this the Jews answered and said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered and said to them, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and you will raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking about the temple of his Body. Therefore, when he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they came to believe the Scripture and the word Jesus had spoken.

As you listen to this Scripture story today, what is one word or thought that really struck you? What image do you take away from this reading?

Step Two: Look into Your Life

Question for Children: How does the church help "build up" your faith?

Question for Youth: How do your words and actions "build up" or "tear down" the Church?

Question for Adults: What does it mean to you that you have a choice of whether to "build up" or "tear down" the Church? In what way do you have *zeal* for the Church?

We received a letter from Rev. Msgr. Richard G. Henning of Seminary of the Immaculate Conception thanking us for a sponsorship in the amount of \$125 for the 11th Annual Seminary Golf Classic which was played on Monday, July 14, 2014 at the Huntington Crescent Club. He acknowledged that this sponsorship would enhance their ability to continue their mission of supporting the education and formation of the seminarians for the Diocese of Rockville Centre.

As we journey through November, we can see how nature points us toward death. The leaves are changing and coming down, the grass stops growing and the plants are dying. All of life is dying. In fact from the moment we are born, we are dying. If we just lived a secular life, we would be depressed. However, as people of faith, we know that our life does not end in death. Our Church points us toward the new life to come.

This weekend the Church celebrates two great Solemnities that revolve around death and new life; All Saints Day (Saturday) and All Souls Day (Saturday evening thru Sunday). All Saints Day reminds us that we have people just like us who are officially called Saints. We can also think of the people we call Saints even though they were never officially been made a saint by the Church. Saints are sinners who never give up. They never give up on loving God, never give up on forgiving others and never give up on holding onto hope. The Saints saw themselves as sons and daughters of God not in the future, but now. They saw themselves as belonging to a life greater than themselves. They belonged to Jesus Christ. All of their life was centered on Him. They gave everything they did or that happened to them redemptive value in that it was for the showing of Jesus Christ to the world. St. Therese of Lisieux once said "I spend my Heaven doing good on earth." The Saints knew they had a destination beyond the limitations of this world. Even though they had a past, they long for the future. They believed and lived out the passage from 1 Jn 3:1-3 which states "what we shall be later has not yet come to light. We know that when it comes to light, we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is". They knew they had a future safe and assured by Christ. They are our role models and heroes reminding us that we are all children of God and that we too can be where they are today, with God in Heaven.

On All Souls Day, we remember and pray for all the dead who have gone before us. We pray that they are with God in Heaven, but we are not sure. This belongs in God's hands. That is why we are to take this day of All Souls and pray for all of our deceased loved ones. This is a day not only to pray, but also to show love to those who did us well and to reconcile with those who may have harmed us. Prayer can unite what death divides. In Jesus Christ, we are given the power to help those who have died through prayer, to renew broken connections, to show our gratitude or forgiveness through prayer. These days it may be a visit to a cemetery, a remembrance of someone at Mass and/or the lighting of a candle. We invite you to look at the Book of Remembrance that marks the death of the loved one's from our parish since late last October. You are invited to add in other names as well. **Please take advantage of the All Souls Novena Envelopes where we priests can pray for your loved ones at Mass in a very special way.** The Book of Wisdom give us hope because it tells us that the lives of the just do not evaporate with death. The souls of the just are in the hands of God. Death cannot take them away from God as long as they live a just life in the image of God. We believe that God is right between us and our loved ones, holding the hand of our loved one on one side and ours on the other, journeying with us until we too enter into our heavenly home and are reunited once again. John's Gospel chapter 6 tells us that we do not have to wait until after death for eternal life. The glory of eternal life happens to us now in and through Jesus Christ. Our journey to eternal life becomes complete after our death. But, we need to live and believe in Him. May we commend all of our loved ones to the Lord, may perpetual light shine upon them and may they all rest in the mercy and peace of God.

REFLECCIÓN



A muchos llama la atención el hecho de que todo el juicio final dependerá de nuestra conducta con el prójimo y que no se contempla nuestra conducta con Dios. Para este juicio parece no examinarse el cumplimiento del primer mandamiento. En realidad, Jesús nunca quiso separar el segundo mandamiento del primero, y aquí los une de manera magistral; nadie los habría podido unir de manera más estrecha: une en un mismo acto de amor el amor a él –primer mandamiento- y el amor al prójimo –segundo mandamiento-, de manera que el amor al prójimo tenga como móvil el amor a él, que es nuestro Dios y Señor: “Cuanto hicisteis a uno de estos hermanos míos más pequeños, a mí me lo hicisteis”. Todo nuestro amor a Dios se debe volcar en el amor al prójimo. En la parábola del juicio final Jesús presenta de manera imaginativa y muy eficaz, la misma enseñanza que expresa San Juan en forma sistemática en una sentencia universal: “Quien no ama a su hermano, a quien ve, no puede amar a Dios, a quien no ve”. **Sin el amor al prójimo no hay amor a Dios. El amor a Dios se expresa y se hace concreto solamente en el amor al Prójimo!**

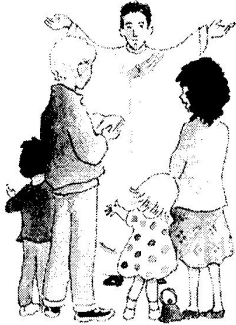

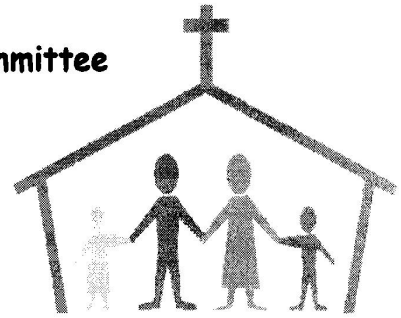

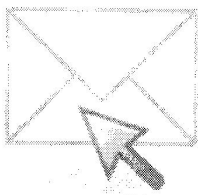
