Breaking Open the Word

Suggested text for faith sharing: .Second Reading, from St. Paul

Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Because of this, God greatly exalted him and bestowed on him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, of those in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father

Step One: Listen to the Word

As you hear this powerful hymn from the early church, what words or phrases strike you in it? Which line of this ancient hymn touches your heart?

Step Two: Look into Your Life

Question for Children: Name one thing that you will do each day this week to remind you that Jesus died and rose to new life for you.

Question for Youth: We hear the story of Jesus' death each year. What did you hear differently this year? How has your faith changed in the past year?

Question for Adults: Identify and share one way that you personally "die in Christ."

Whenever we set a goal to be achieved such as a college and/or a professional degree, a vocation, a healthy weight, fitness, sufficient knowledge of trade or talent, we know that it demands sacrifice, discipline, time, effort and selflessness. This means that we have to die to ourselves. Even though it is difficult and sometimes painful, it is worth the effort when we look back on our results. We see the fruits of our labor if we were faithful to our plan.

In today's Gospel, Jesus is telling us that in order to be his disciples we have to make an effort. Much is expected of us that will be painful. No pain, no gain. However, when we follow him and are obedient to his Word, the fruits of our labor will make a difference in this world and we will receive a gift that is beyond this world, eternal life in Heaven.

Jesus tells us that in order for us to follow him, we need to "hate" our lives. He does not mean that we need to be self-deprecating or putting ourselves down. We need to hate that which prevents us from living freely, such as the fear of death. When we fear death, we will do anything for self-preservation whether we realize it or not. The fear of death lies underneath every other fear, every kind of clinging and all selfishness. This can lead us to do everything we can, including sin, while we have the chance. We want to seek the immortality of power, fame or fortune at the expense of others and ourselves. Such grasping is what Jesus calls loving the life of this world and calls us to reject it.

Jesus is urging us to abandon our doomed desire for self-preservation. He promises to lead the way for us, but lets us know that we too must make the journey. Following Jesus is demanding and not easy. It was not easy for Jesus to show people how to live by loving God and neighbor. He died for it. However, he also rose from the dead and gave us a new life to live. When we exercise our will to follow Jesus by listening to his Word and following his teachings of love, we too will be victorious over death.

These are not easy readings to understand or to live. But we know we can do it because with Jesus, nothing fails. He promised eternal life and he delivered. We also have the examples of saints and martyrs who gave up their lives making this world a better place to live. If they can do it, so can we. As we move toward Holy Week, let us pray, even with loud cries and tears, asking the intercession of all the saints and martyrs that our hearts may be open to God's gift and that it will guide our actions — no matter what the cost.

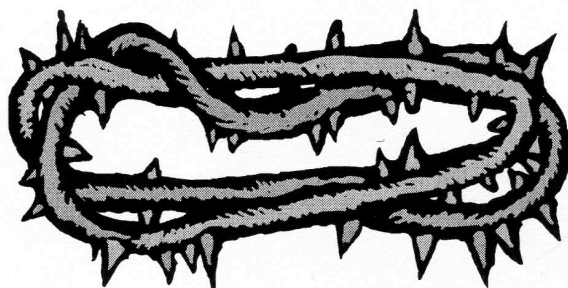

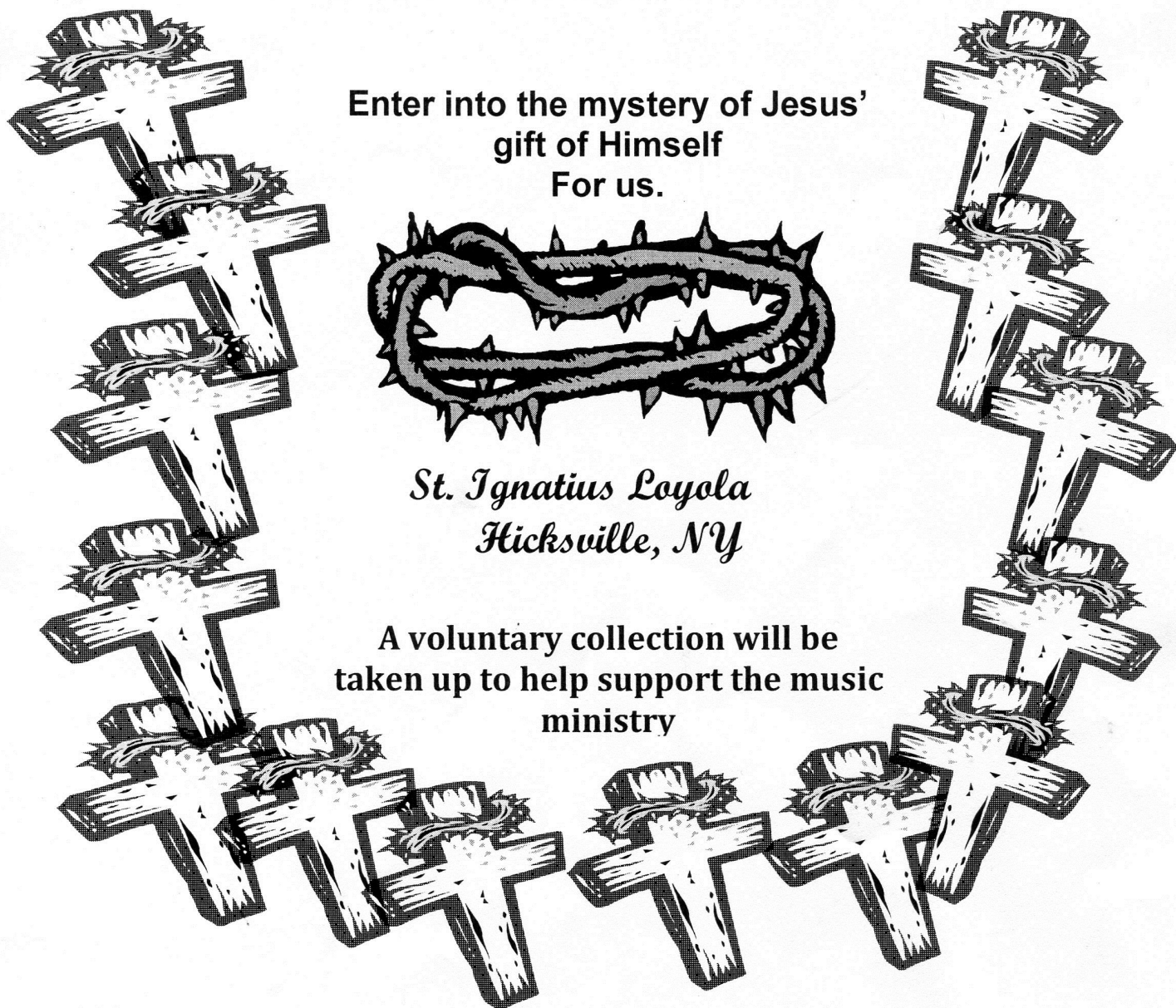

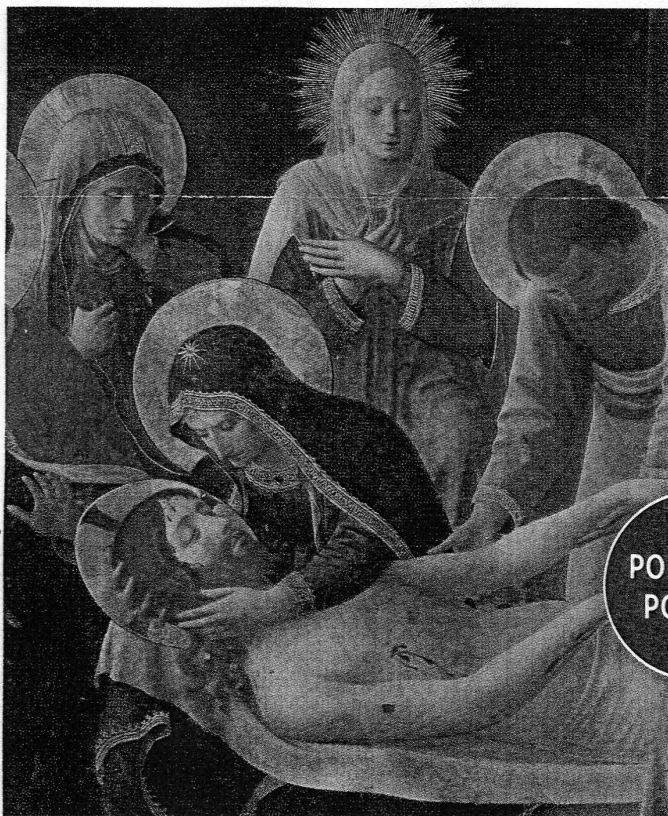

Jesus Predicts His Own Death

John 12:20-33

As the Gospel opens, Jesus is well aware that his time on earth is coming to a close. In fact, he admits that he is “troubled,” but adds, “Yet what should I say? ‘Father, save me from this hour’? But it was for this purpose that I came to this hour. Father, glorify your name.” Upset as he admits he is, he still puts the Father first.



In today's Gospel, a voice responds to Jesus' prayer by saying, "I have glorified it and will glorify it again." Also, Jesus tries to explain to the crowds his true identity, the Son of Man, and the real meaning of the cross — the salvation of all the world.

Through his obedience to the Father, Jesus reveals God's glory. He foreshadows his crucifixion and death through the language of service: "Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there also will be my servant" (John 12:26). As we enter the final weeks of Lent, we are called to bring forth the glory of the Lord as we follow Christ in service to God and one another. Let us remember not just the pain of Christ's passion, but the reason for his death — to bring us the gift of reconciliation with God the Father.

POINTS TO PONDER

- Have you ever considered that Jesus might have been "troubled" about what was going to happen to him? How can the way he dealt with his anxiety help you deal with your own worries and fears?
- Is there someone in my life that I need to forgive? Do I keep in mind that it is as we forgive that we are forgiven?
- How am I doing on keeping my Lenten discipline?

The Sacrament of Reconciliation

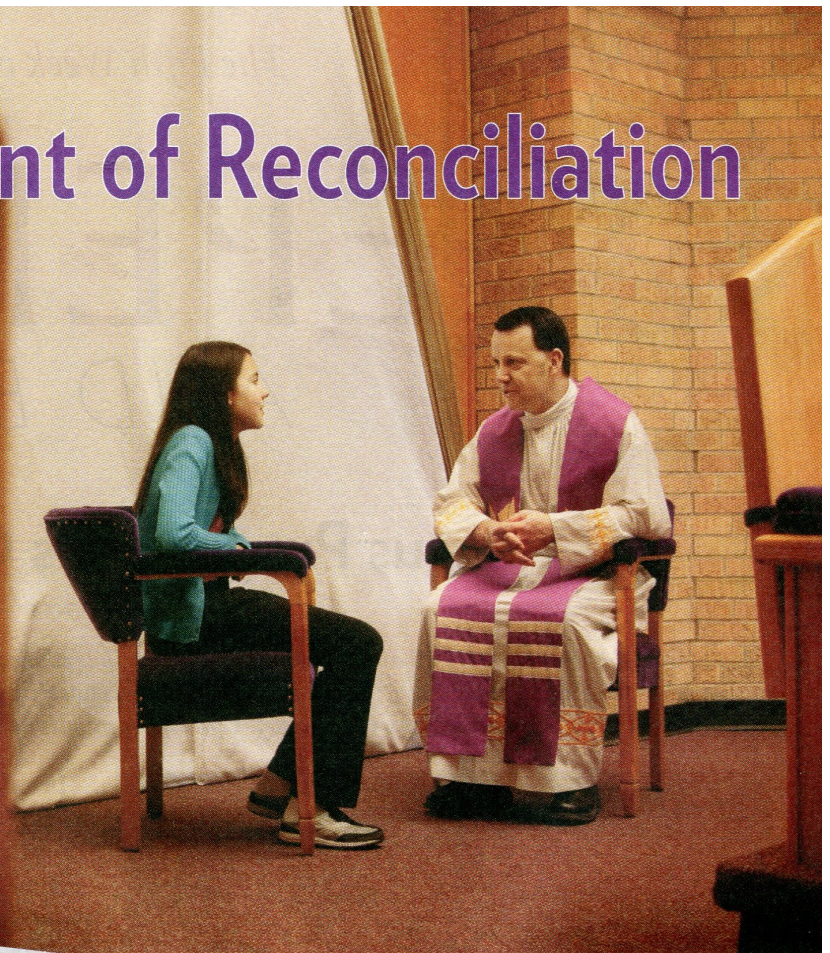
According to Church law, all Catholics “having reached the age of discretion” are required to confess all “grave sins” at least once a year. It is also recommended that they confess venial sins. Lent is the ideal time to make a good confession. Most parishes offer extended confession times and even special penance services.

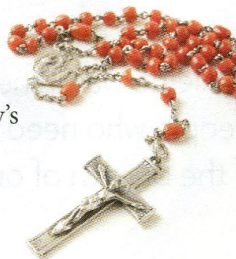


SIGNS OF THE SEASON The Annunciation

Catechism CONNECTION

“It is called the **sacrament of confession**, since the disclosure or confession of sins to a priest is an essential element of this sacrament. In a profound sense it is also a ‘confession’ — acknowledgment and praise — of the holiness of God and of his mercy toward sinful man.

“It is called the **sacrament of forgiveness**, since by the priest's sacramental absolution God grants the penitent ‘pardon and peace.’¹

“It is called the **sacrament of Reconciliation**, because it imparts to the sinner the love of God who reconciles: ‘Be reconciled to God’ (2 Cor 5:20). He who lives by God's merciful love is ready to respond to the Lord's call: ‘Go; first be reconciled to your brother’ (Mt 5:24).”
