Viking Waterford, Ireland

The 'SAVE VIKING WATERFORD' Action Group has called on the Irish government to take control of the Woodstown Viking Site by ordering an immediate publicly funded, full excavation of the site.

The government has known about the existence of the site for **nearly two years** and an announcement about the future of the site has been delayed several times.

Apart from Woodstown, we have no evidence of a large ninth-century Viking settlement from anywhere in Western Europe so European scholars are seeking answers here to questions which have long puzzled them.
