Who am I?

I served a total of seven years on active duty in the Army including a tour of duty for 20 months in Vietnam. I was in the 82nd Airborne division in Fort Bragg, North Carolina as well as the Presidio in San Francisco, California at the Letterman Army Hospital. Following my honorable discharge from the Army, I resumed residency training in internal medicine in San Francisco at Children's Hospital. After completing this I served a two-year fellowship at the Cancer Research Institute at the University of California.

I was in private practice in San Francisco, California and was on the faculty at the University of California as an instructor of medicine. I moved my practice to Reno, Nevada and have been practicing in Reno since 1974. I am Board Certified in Internal Medicine, Medical Oncology, Utilization Review and Quality Assurance. I am Board eligible in Clinical Pathology and Medical Gerontology. I am certified in Homeopathy.

I have been an Associate Professor of Medicine at the University of Nevada, Reno, Medical School and has served as Director of numerous clinical laboratories. I began and served as Chief of Oncology on the Oncology Unit at Washoe Medical Center, Northern Nevada Medical Center and St. Mary's Regional Hospital.

I have been Director of several nursing homes in the Reno/Sparks, Nevada area. At these nursing homes I have started and implemented hospice care centers. I have hospital staff privileges at all three Reno/Sparks hospitals. I have been on the staff at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Reno. I have served as State Surgeon in the Nevada Army National Guard and am a retired full Colonel.

I am married and have five children. My wife is an advanced nurse practitioner and assists in my Practice Management.

Since 1986, I became interested in combining conventional and alternative medicine. I was the only oncologist in the area that would treat cancer patients who were under the care of an alternative physician. Because of this, I became highly criticized from the other oncologists in the Reno/Sparks area. I continued to believe in alternative treatment because my patients were getting good results from both types of treatments. In fact the patients that were integrating conventional treatments with alternative

therapies were doing better. They had fewer side affects from the chemotherapy and their quality of life was far superior. My patients were my teachers. I was convinced that conventional medicine had made great strides with their chemotherapy drugs but were lacking in keeping the patient's immune system stimulated.

I began to study the science of alternative medicine, and in 1995, I received my homeopathy certificate. I believe in the principal that effective cancer care should include many different types of therapeutic support from the intelligent, careful and safe use of chemotherapy to innovative applications of homeopathic remedies, intravenously delivered nutrients, herbs and dietary measures and immune-stimulating therapies. I am currently in the process of researching the use of homeopathic doses of chemotherapy to determine if non-toxic dosing will achieve comparable results.

I have written numerous articles on different subjects regarding cancer and is a coauthor of a chapter in the book: Definitive Guide to CANCER, Publisher: Future Medicine Publishing, Inc., 1997; Chapter 9, pages 194-206 and is a featured author in Alternative Medicine, Women's Series, Volume 2. I am also a noted lecturer at medical conferences throughout the United States. Beth Carpenter also extensively features me in the new novel. **Who am I?**

Heraldic Symbolism

From earliest times it was the custom of nations, clans and families to adopt a symbol which, when borne upon standard or shield, furnished an easy method of distinguishing different units or individuals from one another in the confusion of battle. In medieval times, the science of heraldry was based on this custom. As long as men fought with their faces bared, there was no problem distinguishing one from the other. However, when complete armor was adopted and men could no longer see their friends and antagonists' faces, they were forced to adopt distinguishing marks by which they were easily identified in battle and in peace. These marks or symbols were usually worn on helmets, shields and banners. On the helmet it was called a crest; on the shield it was called a charge; on the banner it was the symbol of the family, or clan or nation. Each family, clan or individual had its own symbol by which it was known. In ancient times, a badge or symbol was a sacred thing, and for a tribe or family to adopt the symbol of another was an act of dishonor. From medieval times to the present, the symbol of Clan Forsyth has been the Griffin, a mythological winged creature, with the head of an eagle and the body of a lion. The Griffin (Gryphon) symbolizes valor and bravery. Did you ever wonder what some of the other family symbols mean? Here are a few:

Caduceus: Symbolizes medicine; also the balance and the union of opposing forces.

Camel: Symbolizes patience, docility and perseverance.

Cannon or Cannon Balls: Symbolizes one who has dared the terror of such a weapon in battle.

Candle: Symbolizes light, life, and spirituality.

Canton: As in a flag borne at the top corner of the shield; symbolizes a reward from the sovereign for performance of eminent service.

Carnation: Symbolizes admiration.

Castle: Symbol of safety.

Cat-A-Mount: This is a puma, or mountain lion. Represents liberty, vigilance and courage.

Centaur: Symbolizes eminence in the field of battle.

Chains: Symbolizes a reward for acceptable and weighty service.

Chaplet (Floral): Usually with green leaves and four roses: the crown of joy and admiration.

Chief: Top one-third of the shield; signifies dominion and authority; granted as a special reward for prudence and wisdom or successful command in war.

Cherub: Symbolizes dignity, glory and honour.

Chevron: Symbolizes protection. Reward for faithful service.

Chough: Cornish Crow: Raven: Symbolizes a strategist in battle; watchful for friends and divine providence.

Cinquefoil: Symbolizes hope and joy.

Civic Crown or Wreath: Symbolizes one who saved a fellow citizen's life or has shown patriotism in defense of one's native land.

Clarion: Symbolizes readiness for war.

Claw of a Bird: Symbolizes the preyer that has been preyed upon.

Clouds: Symbolizes mystery and obscured truth.

Cock: A symbol of courage and perseverance. Considered a badge of a hero.

Cockatrice: Symbolizes terror to all that gaze upon it.

Column: Symbolizes fortitude and constancy. When a serpent is coiled around it, it represents wisdom with fortitude.

Conie: Symbolizes one who enjoys a peaceful life.

Cornucopia: Symbolizes the bounty of nature's gifts.

Cotice: Signifies defense or protection.

Crane or Stork: Symbolizes a close parental bond. Also represents vigilance if holding a rock.

Crescent: Symbolizes the hope of greater glory.

Cross: Symbolizes faith or service in the Crusades.

Cross, Celtic: Symbolizes unity of heaven and earth.

Cross Crosslet: Signifies the fourfold mystery of the cross.

Cross, Fitchee: A combination of cross and sword, it symbolizes unshakable faith.

Cross, Flory: Symbolizes one who has conquered.

Cross, Formee: Symbolizes a military honour.

Crown: Symbolizes royal or seigniorial authority.

Crown, Mural: Symbolizes the defender of a fortress, a token of civic honour and one whom first mounted the breach in the walls of a fortress.

Crown, Naval: Symbolizes one who first boarded an enemy's ship or a distinguished naval commander.

Crown of Thorns: Symbolizes adversity.

Cushions: Symbolizes authority.

Cutlass: Indicates a warrior of the sea.

Cygnet: When gorged with a crown around its neck, signifies dignity.

Cypress: Symbolic of death and eternal life thereafter.
