## From the President!

Due to the economic downturn, the impact to our community has been devastating, and it has not overlooked non-profits, including FCAR. However, we believe that the services that FCAR provides to our community are more important than ever and we are determined to do everything we can to help. The animals always need us, it is a 24x7x365 day a year need regardless of how the stock market is doing. In times like these we come face to face with a staggering increase in requests for assistance, especially from people that never imagined they would need to ask for help before.

Unfortunately as the need exponentially increases, the resources available to fill that need have also diminished significantly. With all of the news coverage I think that everyone fully understands the impact to people in our community, however the impact to the animals has been all but overlooked. For example, you may not have realized how FCAR has been affected.

First, as I mentioned, the number of calls for services and assistance have skyrocketed. People who have lost their jobs or had their homes foreclosed can no longer afford to care for their animals.

Second, our donations have decreased significantly. Obviously this is understandable as everyone has tightened their belts to guard against the uncertainty ahead. But what you may not have also realized was the other funding sources that have decreased. Corporations are cutting back on event sponsorships or grants. Foundations have less money available for grants as they usually have the bulk of their assets tied up in the stock market as well. Even the county government is affected and in our case, the grant of \$5,000 from the county has been indefinitely delayed due to funding issues.

And finally, and I'll admit we did not see this coming, adoptions of our animals has dropped radically. Again, if you stop and think about it you can make the direct correlation from an uncertain economy and less disposable income to a reduction in people's willingness to adopt a new animal into their family. This is the number one issue affecting FCAR right now. Our supporters always come through with donations, especially in hard times. Our volunteers also spend countless hours doing anything they can to raise much needed funds and we are committed that our animals will get the care they need. But it is finding homes for our rescues that has put us at a standstill. We cannot rescue more animals until we place the animals we have in new forever homes and make space at our shelter.

As always we deeply appreciate your support. Please keep your ears open for any opportunity to place an FCAR animal in a new home and refer potential adopters to us or consider adding a new furry friend to your own family.

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## The Story of Bandit

In April 2008, FCAR cruelty investigators went to a Williston farm in Fayette County, TN to follow up on a complaint from neighbors that there were horses on the verge of starvation. Upon arrival, they found horses in terrible condition, with health problems that ranged from emaciation to hair loss and untreated injuries. There were also multiple bones on site including 7 horse heads in various states of decomposition. There was no food or hay for the horses anywhere in sight. Due to the imminent danger the horses were under, rescuers immediately got a warrant and did an on-site seizure to take possession of the 17 horses while the case went to court.

The owner received a summons to appear in court, and FCAR volunteers began taking care of the horses. After the owner's first appearance in court, FCAR volunteers went to his farm to feed the horses and were devastated to find that eleven of the seventeen horses were missing. The owner was

immediately put in jail and for a week no one knew what had happened to them.

Finally FCAR was made aware of a newspaper article from Texarkana, AR that detailed the arrest of the owner's mother and another man who had stolen the horses and were caught with them crammed into a twenty-two foot livestock trailer. They were arrested and convicted of animal cruelty in transportation. The owner was eventually convicted of seventeen counts of animal cruelty and is not allowed to own horses for years.

FCAR received ownership of all 17 horses. FCAR worked with a horse rescue group in Texarkana to help care for the horses that were transported to Arkansas. ARTEX has been very successful in finding them homes once they were healthy.

It was a long, difficult process to get the horses healthy and socialized. However with dozens of FCAR volunteers assisting, the horses were nursed back to health and one by one put up for adoption. Being so young when he was rescued, Bandit was a favorite with our volunteers. From the terrified baby that wildly jumped over a car the first time we tried to catch him to a well mannered boy that is full of life & love.

When we first heard that Priscilla Presley and Graceland Enterprises were interested in Bandit we were in disbelief. This would be the Cinderella story of

animal rescue for our young horse to go from the worst conditions to the absolute best a horse could ask for, living like a king at Graceland.

But the fairy tale came true and Ms. Presley's compassion for animals and dedication to continuing on a tradition at Graceland by rescuing horses resulted in a new forever home for Bandit. Although not all animals can live like a king at Graceland, we can all exhibit the same compassion and commitment to animals as Ms. Presley has done, by giving an abused or neglected animal a second chance and offering them a new forever home.

## 12 Animals Seized in Cruelty Investigation

FCAR received a call about dead horses on the property of Lotta "Laddie" Lewis in Rossville. Upon arrival, cruelty investigators found four dead horses and one very skinny pony that had no clean water and no food. There were also dogs that were being kept in terrible conditions in cages, as well as a very skinny turkey in a pen. The turkey had not been fed in over a month. Lewis was promptly arrested and taken to jail.

Cruelty investigators also went to Lewis' property in Williston. They found two more horses that were underweight, three kittens that were living in filthy conditions in a rabbit hutch and several dogs that were also underweight. All of the kittens, as well as some of the dogs, were anemic and required medication. Some of the dogs also had ringworm.

The 3 horses, 3 kittens and 6 dogs were all seized by FCAR and received the medical care they needed. Lewis had already been previously convicted of animal cruelty twice and faced felony charges for this case. A plea bargain was reached and his sentence would have been 8 years in jail. Instead he will serve 30 days in jail and be on probation for 8 years. He also cannot own any animals for 8 years, and we are allowed to make unannounced visits to his property to make sure he has no animals. He is on supervised probation meaning he will have to report to a parole officer. If he violates his parole, he will go to jail.

Fortunately, 11 of the 12 animals seized have been adopted. The only one that still needs a home is a sweet little black and white terrier named Howser. He's a little boy, but full of energy and loves to play. Hopefully someone will open their home and hearts to him soon.

## Whitaker's Story

Recently Animal Control received a call regarding an injured puppy. The owners of the puppy wanted Animal Control to come to their house to euthanize their puppy because he had been hit by a car. This is not a service that Animal Control performs, however Chief Whitaker's compassion resulted in a call to Fayette County Animal Rescue with a request to save the puppy.

The puppy was only 3 months old and had extensive injuries. He had two broken back legs and a contusion in his lung. He was in extreme pain. FCAR picked the puppy up and rushed him to the wonderful staff at Somerville Animal Hospital. Dr. Weatherly operated on both legs, inserting pins to aid in the healing.

However, a few days later, one of the legs became very swollen and infected. One of the pins had begun pushing through the skin creating a small hole, causing blood to ooze. The puppy had to be rushed to an emergency veterinary hospital, and spent the weekend there on intravenous fluids. After leaving the emergency room he had to have another surgery to repair the pin and flush out the infection.



The puppy was named "Whitaker" in honor of Chief Whitaker, who was instrumental in saving his life. He is in a foster home receiving constant care while his legs are healing. In just two short weeks Whitaker's medical bills have already totaled over \$3,500, and he is still facing more surgery.

## Special Dogs Need Special Homes

Recently we rescued over 50 dogs and cats from two men who had gotten overwhelmed by the sheer number of animals on the property. Unfortunately like in many hoarding cases, their hearts simply were bigger than their ability to care for the animals. All the dogs were either chained to trees or posts, or lived in small pens. Their living conditions were awful, and almost all of the dogs were heartworm positive. The dogs were never around any people except for the two men who owned them and most were very unsocialized.

Unfortunately, we rescue a lot of dogs who are unsocialized because they did not receive any attention when they were young. It can very difficult to get these dogs adopted. Most people want an outgoing, friendly dog that is going to run and play with them immediately, and we completely understand that. But a lot of unsocialized dogs will warm up to

people and learn to trust them once they get over their initial fear and distrust. It just takes time and patience. Once they get to know and trust you, these dogs make great pets. They become so affectionate and attached to you, because now they have found someone they can trust. Most of us in animal rescue have at least one dog like this, and have many stories about the incredible hurdles that they have overcome.

If you are considering adopting a pet, I hope you think about adopting one with special needs. You will be loved and rewarded in so many ways. It may initially take extra time and effort on your part, but it is so worth it.

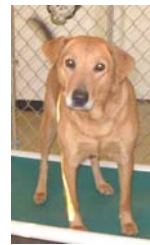

When he reached about 12 years old, I started realizing that he wasn't going to be around much longer. I couldn't imagine coming home every day and not having my dog greet me as he had done for so long. 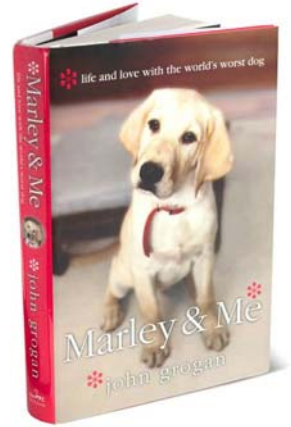
of work but Marley was the worse Lab yet! I was in the story, the life, even the smells of the mangos Marley was eating and for a while the pain was gone.

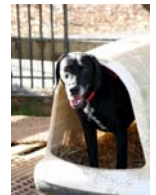
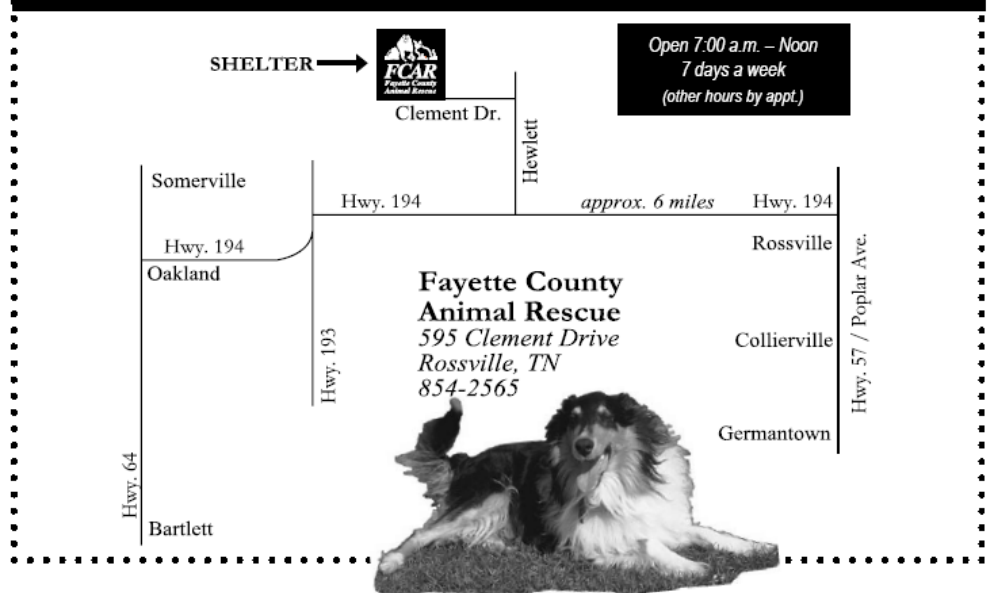
