Thoughts on Leadership

Leadership has been studied for years, dating back to the writings of Attila the Hun. Philosophers, business managers, psychologists, and sociologists alike have attempted to come up with the perfect definition of the vague term "leadership." I feel that no group or professional has come as close as we, the members of the Order of the Arrow, in defining this quality that we strive to instill in our members. Simply put, there is no one definition for a leader. The process of influencing others is subject to interpretation and differs with culture, age, society, etc. However, one attribute applies to all leadership: setting the example. In the Order of the Arrow, we call this "walking like you talk." Our members put it to practice in their daily lives and our leaders make it a reality in units, lodges, and communities across the nation

In his inaugural speech, President George W. Bush boldly stated: "Our duty is to fulfill in service to one another, never yielding, never finishing." I cannot think of a better way to describe our obligations as Arrowmen. Servant leadership is truly the essence of our Order. I can assure you that you will find, as I have, that the members of this organization are the finest people you'll ever meet. If you rise to the challenge of sacrifice and recommitment to service, your own life purpose will undoubtedly spark to light. Oswald Spengler eloquently defined our intentions as members of the human race, "This is our purpose: to make as meaningful as possible this life that has been bestowed upon us; to live and work in such a way that we may be proud of ourselves; to act in such a way that some part of us lives on." We face many challenges today, the greatest of which include discrimination and disrespect. Arrowman Service Award: Designed to reward those Arrowmen who go beyond their immediate responsibilities to help and guide others to new heights, the Order of the Arrow created the Arrowman Service Award. The award will focus on three areas of service: personal, chapter/lodge activities, and general service to the community.

Pappy Award: The "Pappy" Award is presented annually to two Del-Mar-Va Council OA youth members in memory of Jim and Betsy Clark for their dedication to Scouting, Community Service and Education. Scout Leaders, Family, Neighbors or Friends can make nominations. Selection will be based on Scouting Advancement and Community service beyond that required for Scouting Advancement and Academic Achievement.

Founder's Award: Awarded to those who best show the founding principles of the Order of the Arrow.

At the banquet we held a meeting session of the lodge and voted on a few matters carried over from October. We made the Second vote to change Publications to Communications Committee. That motion carried and now the Publications Committee is officially the Communications Committee. The second vote for the change of Costumes to Regalia was discussed



Criteria for Chapter Achievement Program

The Lodge is starting a program that involves the chapters. The one chapter that passes the criteria will be awarded the Best Chapter Award'. This will be a yearly award that is presented this year at the June Weekend but from then on it will be presented at the Banquet. You will receive a plaque that can be hung in your meeting hall and a reward, such as pizza party, ice cream etc. The purpose of this program is to increase chapter participation. All chapters are encouraged to strive for completion of the Criteria. In order to achieve this award you must have at least the percent shone or have the best percent in 4 and 5. Also for 3, 6 and 7 the answer must be yes. Overall you must complete 4 of the 7 to be eligible and if there is a tie after that it will be considered using percent of completion.

- 7. Do you have a rep to fill each committee position at lodge level (the amount of involvement at lodge level)?

There will be forms available for Chapter Chiefs to pick up at the April Weekend. The chapters will be responsible for getting the amount of people at chapter meetings this is an average number of arrowmen that are normally there. The prize for this is not yet determined but most closely it will be a party at either a lodge weekend or a chapter meeting.

member of the Health and Safety Committee. We are looking for at least one member from each chapter, but welcome who ever wishes to join. Members need to be well versed in First Aid Skills. Members will be broken into shifts. The number of volunteers present at the weekend will determine the number of hours each shift will be. The more volunteers we have the shorter the shifts will be. This will also allow you to participate in other Lodge activities during the weekend. Working on Health and Safety Committee might not be a hard or glorifying, but it is important task.

The responsibilities of the Health and Safety Committee, as outlined in the Lodge Leaders Handbook, are:

Responsible for the health and Safety of all Arrowmen and candidates on Lodge weekends.

Keeps up to date medical records on active members. The advanced class one medical form shall be included with the dues payment form.

Regulate medication to those members or candidates who require it. Oversee and treat any and all injuries capable of being treated in camp.

Capable of being available and able to get to any person who needs medical attention.

Another way to be of service to not only the lodge but, to you as well is by completing a health history form (BSA Class 1 Physical Form). The information contained on this form would be accessible to only Health and Safety Committee Members and any necessary Emergency Medical Care Providers. No one wants to think about it but...What if something happened to you and you could not answer for yourself. There are times when we have candidates and members in camp that have medical problems that we on Health and Safety are not aware of. That is dangerous. What if you were diabetic and passed out and hit your head; or had high blood pressure and became disoriented because of a possible stroke and we on Health and Safety didn't know about your problems? What if you were allergic to bees and were stung without anyone else knowing about it? What if you were taking aspirin to help your heart and were seriously cut in a freak accident. These are all situations where someone may not be able to answer for themselves. A current, complete health form will help Health and Safety personnel treat you as well as facilitate the exchange of valuable information to EMS providers and emergency room staff. The only thing we ask in filling out the health form is that you make the form legible and if you run out of room, please use an extra sheet of paper.

Communicating this information as soon as possible to Health and Safety will help us treat you in a timely and appropriate manner. Communication – isn't that what it's all about?
