How to Design Costumes

- 1. Make sure you have a clear idea of the costumes. Know the character and the director's vision for the costumes.
- 2. Double check measurements for all actors, especially for large groups, because some of them are probably wrong.
- 3. When actors whine about their costumes, pretend like you care a little but you don't need to do anything. A lot of them will complain about the looks of it, but that's just their opinion. If they actually need alternations, there is usually a parent who is willing to help.
- 4. When ordering costume parts for large groups, ask everyone their size, and tell them what you're ordering. (Some people might be a medium in shirt size, but small in skirt size.)
- 5. If you're a co-costume designer, just forget about pride. The other person is usually right.
- 6. Make sure you emphasize to the actors that costume parade is a final check, not a first check. Have them all show you their costumes a couple weeks before costume parade, so they have time to re-order and return things that are wrong.
- 7. When you first clean the costume room, it will stay clean for about 2-3 days. During shows, it's pointless but still try to keep it organized and useable.
- 8. Have actors label their costume rack tags and their costume piecess, because people will take things from each other, and it ends up in a big loop.
- 9. Write down who borrows what from the costume room.
- 10. Have a cast list, and write down everything you buy for everyone, so you will have a record to create their costume bills.
