JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Four men associated with the Bandidos motorcycle gang, including its national vice president, are awaiting a Jan. 9 sentencing after pleading guilty to federal drug charges.

U.S. District Judge William H. Barbour scheduled the sentencing Monday, after the men pleaded guilty to distributing methamphetamines. James Thomas Cutrer, 41, and Lindy Burkett, 27, both of Jackson, Jimmy P. Conn, 27 of Sand Hill, and Lawrence R. Hutchins, 26, of Braxton entered the pleas as part of an agreement with prosecutors.

The four were among 10 people indicted following a Sept. 2 raid at various homes by federal and state drug agents. The arrests were made after an 18-month investigation by

Terry Waite to visit Ole Miss

OXFORD, Miss. (AP) — Terry Waite, the Briton who negotiated the release of American hostage David Jacobsen in Lebanon this weekend, will address Monday the University of Mississippi's Omicron Delta Kappa Mortar Board speakers forum.

A consultant and adviser to the archbishop of Canterbury of the Church of England, Waite is continuing negotiations with Moslem extremists who are still holding six Americans hostage in Lebanon.

He first gained international recognition in 1981 when he successfully negotiated the release of a small group of Anglican missionaries held in Iran.
