## Truck weight law

BOONEVILLE, Miss. (AP) — Dept. Commissioner Wiley Humphries said a "limited number" of officers would be sent to enforce a law designed to keep bridges from being damaged by trucks posted in Mississippi.

The teams "are the only way we have to enforce the law outside of the weigh stations perimeter of the state," Humphries told truckers Tuesday.

He and two other Tax Commission officers went with about 50 truckers from Mississippi, and one from Alabama, to discuss the law, which is the maximum in Mississippi.

Humphries said the only way to enforce the law would be to catch every truck that crossed every posted bridge.

The state Highway Commission last month posted more than 800 primary and secondary route bridges because they were not designed to carry traffic that included 80,000-pound trucks.

Accompanying Humphries were Woodward Jr., an administrative assistant, and Richardson, director of law enforcement, and the Tax Commission.
