Student soug

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Iran's revolution regime is hunting a 23-year-old student it says planted two bombs that blew up the ruling party headquarters and killed 72 political leaders.

The suspect was identified Monday as Mohammad Reza Kolahi, who attended the University of Science and Industry and worked at the Islamic Republican Party's Tehran hall. He vanished after the June 28 blast, authorities said.

"He planted one bomb underneath the conference hall rostrum and the other close to a pillar at one end of the hall," an unnamed spokesman for the revolutionary guard militia said in a Tehran Radio broadcast.

The spokesman said Kolahi belonged to the Islamic Marxist Mujahedeen Khalq, a leftist guerrilla group opposed to the fundamentalist Islamic clerics who control the Islamic Republican Party and dominate the revolutionary regime.

Steps conside

MIAMI (AP) — Federal officials, troubled at the influx of Haitian refugees, are considering a proposal to prevent them from reaching U.S. shores by stopping refugee-laden boats on the high seas, authorities say.

The Reagan administration is expected to release next week the recommendations of a task force which has been studying ways to halt the flood of illegal aliens into the United States.

One of the recommendations, Coast Guard officials say, will be "interdiction" — in which Coast Guard cutters would intercept Haitians at sea, then take them to the U.S. Naval Base at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, for processing and deportation.

However, administration officials on Monday denied the reports.

"There is no option under study for taking any refugees to Guantanamo," Justice Department spokesman Dean St. James said in Washington.

The policy would require congressional approval and the cooperation of the Haitian government.
