FR. ALBERT RECALLS THE GOLDEN YEARS


"Know your age not by the number of years, but by the number of friends", is a popular saying. That Fr. Albert Thottunkal, the Asst. Prin-

The climax of the Jubilee celebrations was scheduled to be a twoday mega event. A cultural


and appreciation towards him.

Dr. Joseph Gomes, sdb, the Bishop of Krishnagar, many Salesians, priests, religious and friends of Fr. Albert, there arose hymns and prayers of gratitude to God the Father in a very solemn Eucharist. Fr. Albert celebrated the thanksgiving Eucharist in the Don Bosco Park Circus auditorium along with 60 concelebrants. Fr. John Berger, sdb, the Provincial of Salesian Province of Kolkata preached the homily. The introduction to the Mass by Fr. Albert became emotional moments of his sharing about meaningful events, moments and persons in his life. Many a time his words were interrupted by tears of joy and gratitude. A well decorated auditorium, a rhythmic entrance dance, the offertory procession with special prayers, the melodious singing of hyms of praises, etc. created a prayerful atmosphere of two hours of true "Eucharist".

New CATECHETICAL TOOLS FROM NITIKA

Nitika brought out two new products this year: Lenten Poster and Mysteries of the Rosary poster. "These catechetical tools have been a total sell out," said the director Fr. C. M. Paul, "in spite of the fact that we did not place any advertisement in The Herald weekly, nor in our Catechetics India journal. While a handbill promoted the Lent 2003 posters, we relied on email IDs of Bishops to bring orders for the Rosary poster."

The nine bi-colour screen-printed Lenten Posters developed the themes of the Sunday and Holy Week liturgy. Black and white outline designs with a scripture extract and a brief suggestion of its practical application, the posters were provided with convenient plastic folder to preserve them for future use.

The Rosary poster released to



mark the Year of the Rosary ending in October 2003, consists of the four mysteries of the Rosary: Joyful, Light, Sorrowful and Glorious with their respective five decades all neatly arranged in one single poster.

The 25 x 17.5 inches multicolour poster is available in eight languages: English, Bengali, Hindi, Kannada, Konkani, Kokborok, Marathi and Nepali. For a small fee of INRs. 3,500/- we print in the language of their choice and reach 500 copies of the Rosary Poster anywhere in India for free. Individual poster costs Rs. 15/- plus postage while an order of 10 or more copies costs only Rs.10/- per copy and postage and handling absolutely free in India.

The evaluation that has been spread out during a period of 3 months has been concluded during the end of April, but the final report is still awaited. It will be taken up by Provincial Council towards the end of June.

YOUTH PILGRIMAGE



This venture being taken up by the Salesian Confreres at Dharan may be the beginning of an initiative to reach out and transform the educative service to the young through the Don Bosco charism and love for the young without having to own a Don Bosco school. It's a new thinking! - Fr. J. Manipadam

Book Review

LAY CATECHISTS THEIR FORMATION IN INDIA

Lay Catechists - Their Formation in India Edited by C. M. Paul SDB Nitika/Don Bosco, Kolkata 700015 2003, pp.232, Price: Rs.150.00. USD 10.00

The dedicated and faith-filled lay persons, who work in our parish and mission communities, we call Lay Catechists. Most churchgoers care precious little about this important category of faith workers, their duty to the community and their job description. In fact, the people they serve depend on them for practically all things faith-related. In this context, Lay Catechists -

Their Formation in India, becomes a handy and indispensable reference.

The book has some highly original and seminal contribution on the topic. It contains reflections by 14 eminent people in the field who presented their findings on the topic, during the Nitika Silver Jubilee National Seminar held in Kolkata in November 2002.

The first four chapters present the theme and

its issues. Beginning with a brilliant keynote address entitled: Holding Out Hope to the World, the topic gradually unfolds itself stating the Lay Catechists' identity and role, spirituality, their categories and evolution.

The next eight chapters deal with more practical implications of Lay Catechist's Formation. Besides a sample Manual for the Catechists' On-going Formation, information on Lay Catechist Training Schools in India, and a chapter is dedicated to model Lay Catechist Training schools.

Sharing success stories of Lay Catechists is the *forte* of this book. A chapter entitled Training Women Catechists for Faith Formation highlights women's role as lay catechists. It tells the charism and catechetical styles of three women religious congregations dedicated to catechesis. A second chapter deals with the Selection and Training of Women Catechists.

True to the editor's trademark, the book has not shied away from touching upon a very sensitive issue: Lay Catechists, Their Status and Remuneration.

In the chapter on Ecclesiastical Role of the Lay Catechist, the author-speaker thinks aloud various possibilities in the context of current theologizing.

As is usual in seminars of this sort, the organizers of the Nitika seminar, too, have issued a Statement on Lay Catechist Formation. This is reproduced in the book - it affirms the great sacrifices lay catechists render to further faith formation at all levels, and calls upon church decision makers to come up with projects which go beyond lip service.

Nine pages of Tables / Illustrations complement this professional production. The book's appendix consists of the list of the seminar participants, day by day seminar schedule, and a brief write up about the contributors and a listing of Catechist Training Centres in India.

and Miss Roma Zimba, St. Joseph's Higher Secondary School Kurseong.

The participants were welcomed by the Principal of Salesian College, Fr. (Dr.) George Thadathil sdb who also set the debate rolling with his words from the house. The rules and regulations regarding the event were highlighted by Br Jose P A, the dean of studies. The chairman, Professor Dipankar Basu, enumerated the history of Inter college debate in Darjeeling, and the evolution it underwent from being a calculated competition to an extempore speech before it saw a natural death with the Gorkhaland agitation of the late eighties. It was then revived in the late nineties under the leadership of the staff of Salesian College. Last year it was hosted by St. Joseph's College as part of the Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Professor Dipankar also noted that "unlike in the late 60s or 70s, the present day participants are all local students."

Fr. (Dr) Nirmol Gomes SDB announced the results at which the host team Salesian College Sonada and St Joseph's College Darjeeling were declared winners and Loreto college the runners up with Kalimpong Colleges jointly becoming the third. He commented that the debaters have given enough information regarding the status of Indian democracy and what we need to get on with is performance. The chairman gave away the trophies and certificates of participation while the first year student Bikram Benjamin gave the vote of thanks and concluded yet another day of democratic and peaceful sharing of views and values by students and staff of the hill colleges.

Jesus got on a donkey to begin his triumphant entry into Jerusalem. There were participants in this ceremony from all possible countries with their traditional songs and cultures. There must have been about 2000 people. This year there were less participants, they say, due to the on-going war in Iraq. It was an enthralling experience to re-live the experience of Jesus.

On Holy Thursday, after the community celebration of the Solemn Holy Eucharist and the memorial act of the Washing of the Feet, we went to the garden of Gethsemani to stay awake with the "sorrowful one" for a while. The Church in there was packed to its capacity. There must have been around 3000 people, all on their feet. The ceremony of the betrayal of Judas was wonderfully presented, and one could read on the faces of people that they felt that what Judas did was absolutely wrong.

From Gethsemani we accompanied Jesus through our prayers and Sacrament in the Basilica.

On Good Friday, with penance and abstinence, we walked the way of the Cross, which Jesus had walked 2000 years ago, carrying his Cross to Calvary. You could feel the pinch in the paunch and the hot Sun above the head. We participated actively, singing passion hymns though our throats were simply dry. We could only imagine, how much Jesus suffered walking on this way with the heavy load on his back! Moreover, the chaos and commotion of the Muslim Bazar reminded us of the confusion of the ranting Jewish crowd that wanted to nail Him to the Cross. He had suffered silently for our Salvation!

At sunset there was the ceremony of taking down the Body of Christ from the Cross. This meaningful event was re-enacted by the whole community of the Franciscans marching up and down the Calvary and carrying down the Body of Christ, which was laid upon the stone for the performance of the

last rites before the burial.

The Body was anointed with alabaster perfume. It filled the whole ambient with a magnificent scent. which I had never smelt before. Though remaining in the midst of an innumerable crowd, everyone could have an experience of it. Then the Body of Christ was carried in procession and laid in the Sepulchre.

After the whole crowd had dispersed to their own homes and the main door of the Basilica was sealed, 13 of us from Cremisan and few other people remained back for keeping a night vigil. During the whole night we were walking about all over the basilica lest we should fall asleep. The night seemed to be pretty longer than usual. It was a wonderful moment to prav for different intentions. The Orthodox priests got up at midnight with a loud gong of the Bell, to carry out different moments of their prayer. Their unending chanting and singing kept us awake the whole night. At 6.00 am, we went back to Cremisan.

On Easter Monday, we had a memorable procession to Emmaus, to commemorate Jesus' apparition to the two disciples. We had a beautiful Eucharistic Celebration with the community of Jerusalem. The Church was packed with people!

This was indeed a wonderful experience of Easter for me. ALLELUIA! Praise the Lord! is all I can say in thanks.

FEELINGS FROM THE HEART

On the occasion of Fr. Albert Thottunkal's Golden Jubilee of Religious Profession here are a few simple and frank thoughts he shared with KnotS - his feelings from the heart.

KNOTS: What are your strongest feelings as you look back at the past 50 years of your life? **Fr. Albert:** Just feelings of gratitude: 'Thank you, Thank you, Thank you'. These are the two words that ring in my heart and in my mind at all times. That's all. I thank God, our Blessed Mother, my superiors.

KNOTS: Who has been the strongest influence in your life, among the people you have come across in the past 50 years?

Fr. Albert: Fr. Bacchierello has been the strongest influence in my life, especially in the early years. He was the one who led me on during the troublesome days of growth, the aspirantate days. Then I would like to mention also Fr. Sheehy who was of great influence in the latter years after I became a priest.

KNOTS: The happiest moments of your life?

Fr. Albert: My ordination day. My first Mass, when I held Jesus in my hands for the first time.

KNOTS: What is the thought that has sustained you, given you power and energy especially in difficult moments?

Fr. Albert: The thought of Our Blessed Mother. I just cry to her like I used to cry out to my own mother

"*Ente Maatave! Ente Ammacchio!*" [My Mother! My Mummy!]. And I know she is there to help.

KNOTS: If you were given the chance to re-live some of the moments of the past, which would you choose?

Fr. Albert: My Ordination. My first Mass. The moments of consecration of the first Mass.

KNOTS: The period of your life you would have been happy to be without?
