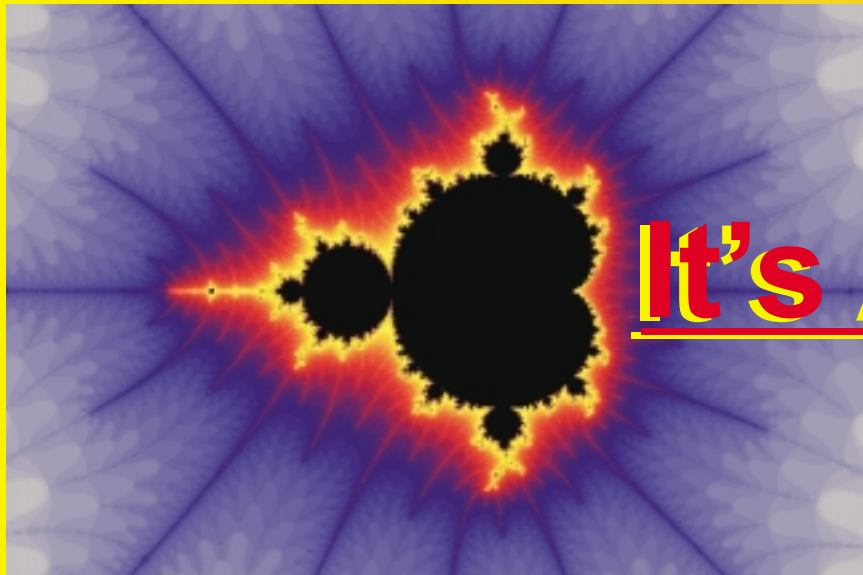
Why The New Age Computer Club (NACC) Is Free by Val Scarcia, Editor mrval@rcn.com

The New Age Computer Club has been a natural formation for those who have given many thousands of hours of their time to other nonprofit groups and clubs

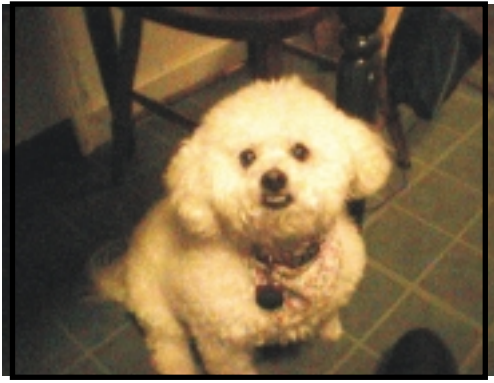

A View From The Top

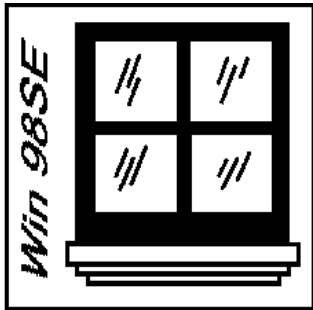

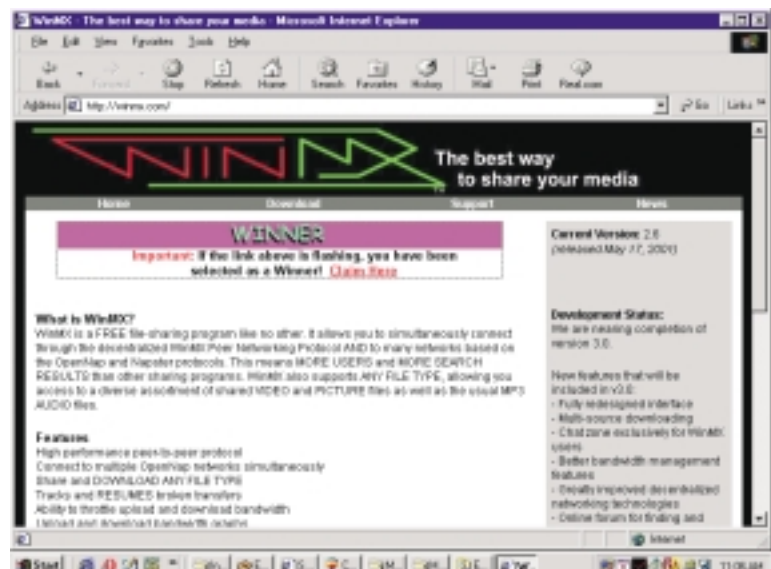

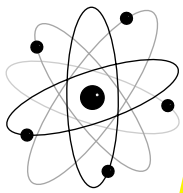

ATOMIC TIME

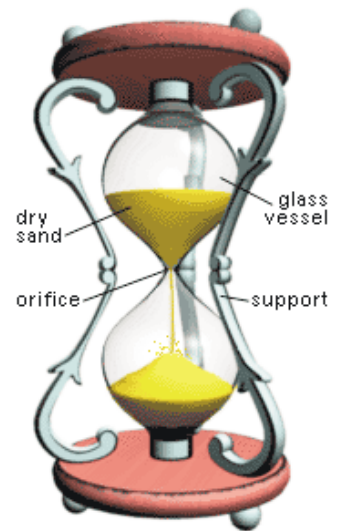
Atomic Time

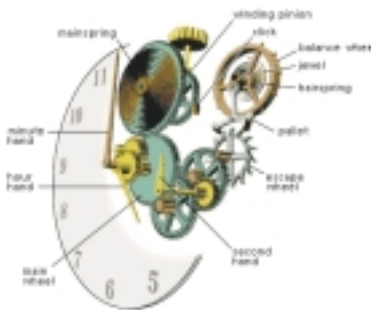
It is interesting to trace the history of time and its measurement. The shadow of the sundial, the water clock, the sand clock, the burning of candles in increments. Clocks with gears and weights, clocks with spring movement, clocks with the periodicity of the pendulum, the quartz movement, all lead to the more accurate time keeping of the atomic clock. Time keeping, historically, always had to do with the rotation of the earth, and the dividing of daylight and nighttime hours into smaller increments of hours, minutes and seconds. Today, this is not accurate enough for many purposes, since the tides and other alterations do not give the accuracy needed for very precise measurements.

All of us who are on the Internet are able to use available timeservers which can update our windows operating systems automatically within fractions of a second. For everyday users, like myself, this is great accuracy. If you go to the following governmental public domain website of the NIST:

<http://www.bldrdoc.gov/timefreq/service/its.htm>, you can download the available FREE programs for different operating systems over the Internet, that will automatically set your system clock in your PC and MACs to fractions of a second.



The theory of time accuracy is to subdivide time into continually smaller and smaller measurable increments. This is what has happened with the atomic clock, using an oscillating microwave signal synchronized to the resonance of cesium 133 atoms. The atomic clock has redefined the second by subdividing the second into increments of 9,192,631,770 energy changes per second within a cesium 133 atom. To me this means that the atomic second is defined as having nine billion, one hundred and ninety-two million, six hundred and thirty-one thousand, seven hundred and seventy units per second! The energy changes per second within the cesium 133 atomic clock atoms are related to quantum mechanics, with the outer electrons going from ground state to an excited state, back and forth, in over 9 billion energy transitions per second!



These energy transitions have basically replaced the concept of the pendulum of earlier clocks and timepieces, giving very high accuracy.

In closing, I would like to point out that time is not very well understood by anyone, and is not something we should take for granted. As St. Augustine said, "Ask me about time, I'll tell you all about it. Ask me what it is, I know nothing." Most people know little about time, as it is impossible to get at its origins!

1) January's XP Surprise: Your PC As A Paperweight

Bill Gates says that some 17 million copies of XP have shipped since the operating system was launched late in October. It's a safe bet that a high percentage of these sales and shipments were bunched at the very end of last year, and the very beginning of this one. Between end-of-year budget purchases, holiday promotions, and Christmas gift PCs preloaded with Windows XP, millions of people--- and thousands of LangaList readers--- are right now experiencing their first few weeks with the new operating system.

That means many users are heading for a surprise as the internal counter inside every copy of Windows XP gets ready to enforce the mandatory "Windows Product Activation" (WPA) after one month of use.

The surprise isn't WPA itself--- we've covered that in depth. The surprise is the way it's implemented in Windows XP: You see, unlike the WPA in the Office XP/2002 products, one misstep with the version of WPA inside Windows XP (the operating system) may leave you unable to boot your PC; unable to access or back up your files; and in fact, unable to do *anything useful at all* with your PC. Your shiny new XP system will be nothing but a giant paperweight!

If you're in your first month of use of XP, you need to know what's coming. If you don't, that one WPA misstep could leave you with no way to access or salvage your data!

MICROSOFT GETS DESPERATE.

Two weeks ago I received a slick folded 8-1/2 X 5-3/4, mailer with what appeared to be an advertisement. It was addressed to Don Terp, President, Read Mountain Communications at my current address. The return address was Microsoft in Redmond Washington.

I thought it was another promotion for Windows XP and almost tossed it into the trash. I glanced at the bottom of the front of the folded ad and read, "Inadvertently using unlicensed software could hurt in more ways than one." I had to open this one. I quickly undid the gobs of adhesive and unfolded the glossy sheet to it's full 8-1/2 X 11-1/2 size. It now said, "But the publicity for running unlicensed software could hurt more than a \$150,000 penalty," the title at the top of the page really hit me.

I quickly turned it over to see if it was miss-addressed and/or mailed. Nope, it was addressed to me.

One of the most important points of communications is credibility. To say that "using unlicensed software could hurt more than a \$150,000 penalty," is a threat. It's against the law to threaten anyone while trying to collect money.

Now, I haven't used Read Mountain Communications as a business name for years. Someone was scanning old (very old) mailing lists and comparing them with Microsoft's records, kicking out all mismatches.

They were making several assumptions

1. That if you had a business name, you had to have Microsoft Software, more than likely an operating system.
2. You may be a large business with many computers all with copied operating systems, (unlicensed)
3. You are a candidate to make Microsoft richer and toss a few crumbs to the poor guys who they talked into taking the heat by taking the phone calls.

They were bottom fishing for unlicensed Microsoft software users to get them to sign up at a hefty fee. It appeared to me immediately that Microsoft was not doing well with Windows XP and was looking for extra revenue.

This all stems from a group called BSA for Business Software Association, which the flier assures me is hunting down offenders, like a Wild West Bounty Hunter, and getting them fined. They haven't reached the mass media with this one. I have seen nothing on CNN or Fox News.

I called the 800 number at the bottom of the sheet and a rather hesitant male voice answered. My first question was, "What is this all about?"

I had turned on the phonograph record. He spieled out a minute and a half of rapid speech which was totally unintelligible. After I calmed him down I found out that what he was saying, up front, was that he wanted to assure me that he didn't work for Microsoft, but rather for a contractor who sold software licenses and was checking up on listed businesses who didn't match Microsoft's records. Hopefully they would land a big fish and collect a substantial fee for selling a big license.

Rather than get defensive and quickly tell him that all my software is duly licensed, it is, I chose to get as much information as I could. I used the good cop, bad cop technique, with the bad cop being a phantom. I listened to his story and believe me he was really earning his money. He disliked the people who swore at him and those who wouldn't let him get a word of explanation in to the conversation. It wasn't a very satisfying job, that's for sure.

Finally I read my registration off of the computer screen and he wanted a few more answers, which I gave him. He then warned me that I might get more mailings and that I should ignore them. HE would take care of it.

Whoever came up with this hair brained scheme should be shot at sunrise. All of these members of the BSA, talk to each other. Somehow they have figured that 14% of their software users are stealing. They pull this out of thin air (there is no way that they can tell how much copying goes on).

Interestingly, I also talk to Adobe occasionally and they too come up with the same 14% copied software. Considering the difference in the volume of programs sold, that is impossible.

For sometime, Adobe has had a protection program that prevents anyone from installing upgrade software on a computer with no previous version of that program. I went through five different programs with them, installing each on a new computer, with no previous versions of the software. It was not easy.

Microsoft now prevents you from using XP beyond a certain date after installation without registering it. I know of one poor soul (I'm sure there must be hundreds) who forgot to register his copy and had to reformat his drive. XP had locked it up and he lost everything.

This turned out to be very expensive, since he had a lot of customer proprietary material on that drive and he lost it all. His customers weren't happy, to say the least. I haven't found out yet how he made out.

NAPSTER CASE COULD GET FINAL SETTLEMENT

napster returned quietly to business earlier this year, but its legal situation remained in doubt. Now it appears that the file-swapping site is working hard to settle the copyright infringement suit that the recording industry filed three years ago in its effort to end the unauthorized trading of music. Federal Judge Marilyn Hall Patel has allowed a 1-month delay in the case so the two sites can continue negotiations. The site shut down in February 2001 after Patel ruled that it should filter unauthorized songs from its system. The Recording Industry Association of America also showed signs Wednesday that it is prepared to wrap up its case against Napster. "Since re- launching a few weeks ago, we understand they have limited their repertoire to licensed music. Resolving the lawsuit may now be feasible," RIAA President Hilary Rosen said in a statement.....

IDENTITY THEFT TOPS FRAUD LIST

Identity theft was the most frequent consumer fraud complaint in 2001, according to the Federal Trade Commission, which released its top ten list Wednesday. About 42 percent of consumer complaints to the FTC in 2001 were about stolen identities, followed Internet auctions at 10 percent and Internet services and computer complaints at 7 percent. The FTC has started a fraud complaint database called Consumer Sentinel that takes information from law enforcement agencies in the United States and Canada, as well private sector sources.....

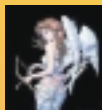

The IQ Chip
