General Description

Introduction to Mass Communications focuses on studying the process, theory, and models of mass communications. The course will cover the histories and structures of the print media (newspapers, magazines, books) and the electronic media (radio, recordings, films, television, cable) as well as the interdependence among the various economics, and the social effects of mass communications.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, each student will be able to:

- Define terminology common to mass media communications
- Identify, analyze, and understand the functions, impact and effect of the mass communications media in American society.
- Describe the organization structure of print and electronic media business models. Emphasis is placed on corporate synergy and media consolidation
- Develop critical thinking skills. Students will be able to apply the DIE method Description, interpretation and evaluation skill in comparing mass media

Attendance Policy
