



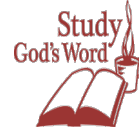

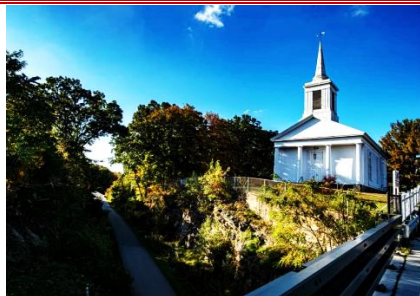

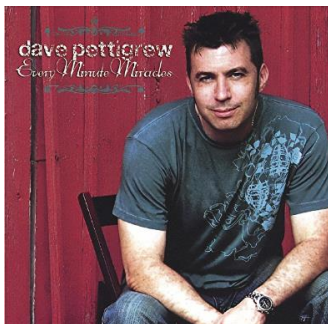
**October 2

## A STATUE OF LIBERTY

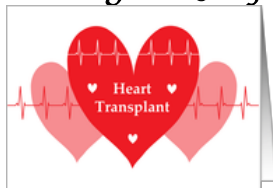

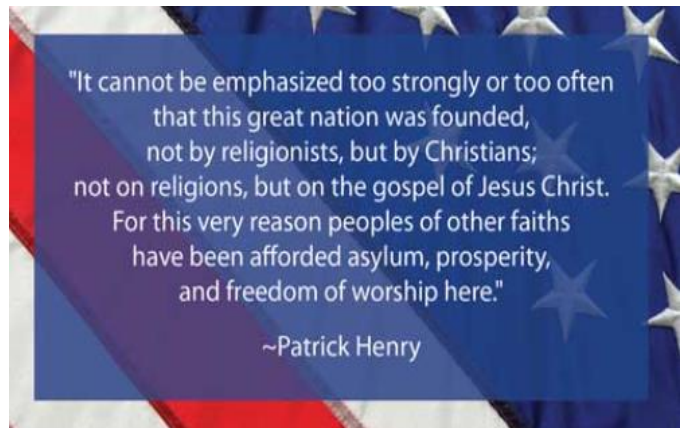

## **CHURCH HISTORY PART 6 - THE EVENING REPORTER – APRIL 27, 1885**

**MONDAY, APRIL 27, 1885**

### **BLACKSTONE BAPTISTS**

Sketch of the Early History of the  
Free Will Church.

Rev. Lewis Dexter, pastor of the Free Baptist church at Blackstone, yesterday afternoon preached a sermon on the early history of the church. He first referred to the conversion of Benjamin Randall of New Castle, NH, the founder of the denomination, which occurred Sept. 30, 1770, the day of George Whitfield's death. The announcement of that death was the means of his conversion. Soon after he and his wife became members of the Congregational church in his native town, an island of about 500 acres at the entrance of Portsmouth harbor. On the occasion of the sprinkling of one of his children, he was led to search the New Testament for authority, which he could not find. As the result of his study he concluded that only the immersion of believers is valid baptism. Hence he was baptized and united with the Baptist church in Berwick, ME. Like Luther, he now determined to turn from the traditions of men and depend upon God's word for instruction. He was thus led to proclaim the free moral agency of man and to reject the dogmas of pre-destination and election as they were then held and taught. For these "errors in faith" he was tried and disfellowshipped in 1770. The next year he organized a church of seven members in New Durham, NH, which is called the mother church of the denomination. For about twenty years they took only the name of Baptist churches and recognized no other. They were called Freewillers by others, in derision, and after a time accepted the title and were incorporated

Freewill Baptists. Their labors were confined almost exclusively to New Hampshire, Maine and Vermont for a third of a century. In 1812 John Colby of Vermont, a young man of deep piety and great spiritual power, though frail in body, made an evangelistic tour on horseback through Massachusetts, Rhode Island and part of Connecticut. December 15 of that year a church of nine members was organized in Burrillville, RI. For nearly eight years this was the only church of this order in this part of New England. For this reason it came to be designated as the "Lone Star" church. In 1819 and 1820 there was quite an extensive revival interest which resulted in the organization of several churches in Rhode Island and vicinity. Miss Clarissa Danforth, who preached her first sermon in Burrillville then the preceding autumn, began her labors in this place in the fall of 1819. She was highly gifted with revivalistic powers and her labors resulted in many conversions. December 26, Ahab Read and his wife Ruth were baptized. The next spring nineteen others were baptized and organized as a branch of the First Smithfield church of Greenville, RI, which was organized that spring. They continued thus until Oct. 30, 1822, when they were organized as the Mendon Freewill Baptist Church of Christ, with thirty-six members, one-third of whom were males, Reubs. Allen and David Swett being the officiating clergymen of the council. Rev. Joseph White, pastor of the Smithfield church, was chosen pastor, Reuben Thayer clerk and Ahab Read deacon. The next day two others were baptized and united with the church. In the

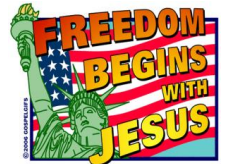
early part of the next year the church was admitted to the Rhode Island quarterly meeting, and Benjamin Arnold was elected as second deacon, who was afterwards publicly ordained as deacon at the quarterly meeting. In the fall of 1823 they arranged with Rev. Daniel Williams to be with them the fourth Sunday of each month and Rev. Joseph White, the pastor, to be with them on every fifth Sunday. Prior to this they had a preacher with them only occasionally. In the spring of 1824 they arranged to hold their Sabbath services as follows: First Sunday of each month at Dea. Arnold's, second at Dea. Read's, third at Joseph Thayer's and the fourth and fifth at Blackstone schoolhouse. The next year several members were dismissed to join with others in forming a second Smithfield church. Soon after this Dea. Read was ordained as a minister of the Gospel. The following December and January he and Rev. Mr. White, on five different Sabbaths baptized and welcomed to the church twenty-five persons.

October 7, 1926, four years from the date of the organization of the church, and nearly six and one half from its reception as a branch of the First Smithfield church, Rev. Mr. White's request to be released from the pastoral care of the church was reluctantly granted. During his pastorate ninety-six persons, one-fourth of them males, had been received into its membership. Meanwhile eleven were dismissed, six excluded and three died, leaving a membership of seventy-six persons.

Here the speaker closed his sketch with a promise of continuation of the subject at some future time.
