We wanted to grow on the energy of our Peace Vigil (this congregation – along with others from the community – held a Peace Vigil every Saturday from April 5, 2007 through July 25, 2009). All we knew last October was that Peace Sunday would be a chance to reflect together on what our community could do to work for peace, and/or to support returning veterans. Last year, Anne Perkins took the lead in facilitating Peace Sunday conversations, providing an important link from the days of the Peace Vigil into the future... Thank you, Anne!

This year, Peace Sundays are taking a new direction. We will try to borrow from what was best about Program Sundays in past years as well as what was best about last year's peace discussions to present an "all new" Peace Sunday format which will often feature a speaker or presenter. Betty Davis is taking the lead in organizing these Peace Sundays, and she has already lined up the first three presenters (Joanne Faster of the House of Education and Peace is coming in October; Jane Manring will be coming to help us learn more about Quaker traditions in November; and Joseph Goldstein of the Insight Meditation Society will come in December).

Please note that my office hours will be on Fridays from noon until 5 p.m. (or please contact me for a special appointment if that does not work for you).

Peace is more than being "not at war". Peace in the fuller sense is about finding states of well-being, happiness and fulfillment for all; peace in the fuller sense recognizes that being "not at war" ultimately requires that we are always trying to create states of well-being, happiness and fulfillment for ourselves and for everyone we meet. Peace Sunday will be a chance to think about peace in the personal, social, national, international, and ecological spheres. I am very excited about this! I think it will be a wonderful opportunity for our members and friends in the community. Meanwhile, we continue with our guest preacher Sundays, which proved a popular chance to hear a variety of Unitarian Universalist ministers – and ministers-in-training – preach and lead worship. It is always fun and enlightening to experience a different style and perspective, so don't miss it!

Oh, yes. And two Sundays a month you are stuck with me. I am "happy to be stuck with you" (as the song puts it). Here's to the beginning of another fulfilling year!

On Sunday, October 3 the service "Association **Sunday:** will Celebrating 50 Years and the Future of Our Faith" with Rev. Lara Hoke. This special service will celebrate the past 50 years of UUism (since the merger of the Unitarians and the Universalists) and the future of our faith. Proceeds from this year's special collection will go to ensuring that our faith thrives for generations to come. Beginning in the spring of 2011, the Unitarian Universalist Association will embark on an in-depth strategic review in order to develop an action plan to strengthen our community for future generations. Howard Apley will be back to play piano. Join us!

Sunday, October 3 at 11:30 a.m. we will have the "Interfaith Blessing of the Animals" on the Petersham Town Common. Join us for interfaith service of Congregational Parish, Unitarian; Peter's Church; and the Orthodox Congregational Church. Everyone is welcome to bring their pets to be blessed. He was facilitator of the Brown UU Group in 2006-2007 and is now on the board of the Harvard UU Ministry for Students. Outside the classroom, Bucky enjoys playing fantasy baseball and leading the Divinity School to ultimate frisbee victory over the Kennedy School of Government. On Sunday, October 17, the service will be "Standing with Our Muslims Sisters and Brothers", with Rev. Lara Hoke. In recent months, we have witnessed a surge in anti-Muslim sentiment in this country. We saw the fear and furor around the discussion of Islamic Community Center Mosque being built in New York City two blocks from "Ground Zero". recently, we learned that a small congregation Gainesville, Florida, in threatened to burn copies of the Qur'an (the Holy Scripture of Islam). The Third Source of Unitarian Universalism is "Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life". Islam is one of the world's great religious traditions and is one of our UU sources, yet how much do you know about it? Join us in worship as we go deeper in strengthening our understandings of Islam, learning how it can indeed inspire our ethical and spiritual life. Debbie Kent will be back to play organ and piano. On Sunday, **October 24**, we will have our first **Peace Sunday** of the

On **October 28** at **7 p.m.** Rev. Lara Hoke will offer the final session of the classic Adult Religious Education course, "Building Your Own Theology". This class will be for those who went to the previous two sessions in September.

On Sunday, **October 31**, we welcome guest preacher the Rev. Cheryl Leshay. The sermon, "In Between", considers the ways in which we are always coming from somewhere, or going somewhere - but where are we, With inspiration anyway? from Hallowe'en and Harry Potter, Rev. #### **Petersham Branch Alliance**


The next Alliance meeting is October 14 at 7:30 p.m. at the Davis Memorial. The projects which the Alliance is working on are:
