

#### The Pastor's Letter

"Advent, like its cousin Lent, is a season for prayer and reformation of our hearts. Since it comes at winter time, fire is a fitting sign to help us celebrate Advent. If Christ is to come more fully into our lives this Christmas, if God is to become really incarnate for us, then fire will have to be present in our prayer. Our worship and devotion will have to stoke the kind of fire in our souls that can truly change our hearts. Ours is a great responsibility not to waste this Advent time." Edward Hays, A Pilgrim's Almanac, p. 187

So many of us focus on Christmas that as we do the busy activities that are part of the season we miss the church emphasis on preparation as the weeks of Advent unfold before Christmas. When Edward Hays uses the image of fire, we need to remember that you must carefully build or add to the fire so that it will continue to do the user any good.

Advent is that "building" and that "fuel" that makes us burn brightly in praise of the Christ Child on Christmas Eve. How do we go about doing that?

Perhaps as good a guide as any is that early on in the history of the church Advent was considered a "smaller" less intense version of the penitential season of Lent. Therefore things like fasting, special times of prayer, as well as devotion are all appropriate for the season.

The other is to enter in with that understanding when we worship during Advent. To some of us that might sound extremely hard, since it is a sad fact that the joyous season of Christmas, "secular style", is never far from us in the marketplace or in the media.

Still, there is great value that as the focus on Advent points to Jesus' birth, Advent begins to prepare us by remembering that He will come again. There is value again in the cry of John the Baptist to "prepare" to remind us that He who is coming is not just some prophet, but the very king of kings himself. There is great value to be amazed to see how God uses a common 16 year old girl to be the bearer of God's son. There is great value to hear the "foretelling" words of the prophets to remind us that Christ's birth was not a current happening, but the culmination of God's promise from ages before.

Each then is another "log" which stokes our spiritual "fire" so that our praises resound and it blazes brightly so that all can see.

So may we this year not only "keep Christ in our Christmas", but use the season of Advent so that the "Christ that we keep" is evident in us and to those all around us as we walk through Advent.

#### A Special Liturgy

This year, Reformation Sunday, October 30<sup>th</sup>, also marked the observance of the 300<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the birth of Henry Melchior Muhlenberg.

To mark the occasion, Pastor John treated us to what is known as "The Muhlenberg Liturgy" or "The Church Agenda (Kirchenagende) of 1748". This was the first official liturgy adopted by Lutherans in North America. Pastor Muhlenberg, who helped organize St. James, chaired the committee that prepared this liturgy, which was the only authorized service among Lutherans in America at the time of the Revolutionary War.

For this service, Pastor John attired himself in the style of that era rather than with the liturgical colored vestments of today.



It was both interesting and enlightening to be able to get some sense of how our predecessors celebrated the Eucharist in the original "straw church". Unfortunately, the weather kept many people from enjoying the experience.

#### Lutheran History in America

(From ELCA's timeline, 'Our History in Context'.)

John Campanius is referred to as the "saintly apostle of the Indians." Called in 1643 as pastor for the congregation at Fort Christina along the Delaware River (the first Swedish settlement in North America), he built the first Lutheran church building in America on Tinicum Island, south of Philadelphia, in 1646. Campanius believed his call also extended to the native Delaware people. He translated Luther's Small Catechism into the Delaware Lenni Lenape language, although it was not printed until 1696, long after he left the New World and some 14 years after his death.
