

What do you say after you say "hello"? Almost every weekend we have visitors or newer members in worship. Sometimes they're from out-of-town, sometimes they are from the neighborhood "checking out" our church to see if there is something (or someone) here that will speak to them, hold them, or help them.

Whether they are one-time, first-time, occasional or regular visitors, part of our ministry is to welcome them to the household of God, to show Christian hospitality to them, and to let them sense our Christian love and concern.

Many of our visitors tell me our church is warm and friendly. I know it can be awkward for some of us to approach strangers and extend hospitality. But it's our ministry (how would you like to come to church on a Sunday morning or Saturday evening and have no one greet you?).

Let me suggest a few questions and statements you can use to have an initial conversation with some one you don't know:

"Hello, I'm Pastor Paul. Welcome. Have we met before <u>or</u> are you new to our church <u>or</u> I'm pretty new here myself so I'm still learning my way around <u>or</u> I've been here forever and it's nice to see new faces..."

"Let me introduce you to some other folks..."

I've been a member here for several years, and I really enjoy being active here. How did you happen to come here...?"

"Is there anything special or specific you're looking for in a church? Maybe I can introduce you to some people here who are interested in similar things..."

"What sort of work do you do? Chances are I can introduce you to someone who does something similar..."

"Did you meet the Pastor? Let me introduce you..."

"Have you lived in other places? How do you find it in this area?"

You get the point. It is our job to show hospitality. The better we do it, the more welcoming our church, the better we help fulfill the mission of Christ. "I was a stranger," Jesus said, "and you took me in". It still works.

A New Era Dawns

Our long wait ended on Sunday, March 21st, when a special Congregational Meeting voted almost unanimously to call Pastor John Van Haneghan to be our new spiritual leader. Pastor notified us the same evening that he was accepting the call. He had that weekend conducted both the Saturday evening and Sunday Worship services.

Pastor John comes to us from Syracuse, NY, where he has been the Pastor of St. Stephen Lutheran Church since 2001. All here who have met and spoken with him have been impressed with his deep spirituality and sense of commitment to the church and its people. He will conduct Worship and preach his first sermons as our called Pastor on the weekend of May 22nd and 23rd.

Our new Pastor will be formally installed on Sunday, June 13th, at 4:00 pm. Come and be part of this new beginning for your church.

At the same time we have to express our deep appreciation for the Pastors who have given so much of themselves to us over the past four and one-half years. This is especially true of our current Interim Pastor (and, it seems, principal Supply Pastor) Paul Brndjar, as well as his brother, Pastor John Brndjar. Our thanks also go out to Pastor Jane Gaeta, who served as our Interim Pastor for over a year. Without their help and guidance it would have been near impossible for us to have survived this long vacancy as a functioning congregation. Thanks also to the Call Committee for the long hours they devoted to bringing us to this happy conclusion.

A New Reality Faces Us

As joyful as we are to finally once again have a full time Pastor to lead and guide us, we have to at the same time come to grips with the situation that has developed at St. James over these past years. It is painfully obvious that regular Worship attendance has declined markedly during the vacancy. Along with that has gone a substantial drop in Offerings.

The truth is that our current level of income will not be able, over the long term, to meet our expenses. Not having had a full-time Pastor has cushioned us from some financial responsibilities, but that is no longer the case. Although the primary purpose of a church is of course spiritual, operating it in the real world does require money.

Council and the Finance Committee have been working on some ideas for fund-raising efforts, but the cornerstone of any church financial plan has to be the Offering plate. Please prayerfully consider what you can do to help your church in this regard.

If you yourself have been turned away from regular attendance by the vacancy situation, come back to your church home and meet the new Pastor. I am certain you will find it a great way to reconnect with St. James. Likewise, if you know any who might be interested in joining us and becoming members, encourage them to stop by for a Saturday evening or Sunday morning visit.

We will use these points to upgrade our technology with specific items such as a computer for the newly called Pastor, a DVD projector for use by the Sunday School and for gathering events here at St. James. Simply place your used cell phones, inkjet or laser printer cartridges in the collection bin outside the Ed Frey Memorial Hall. We will send them into Funding Factory for credit. Corporate donations are gladly accepted. Empty copier toner cartridges will be turned into Staples for credit to offset our current office supply costs. We can recycle up to 10 copier toner cartridges per month with Staples.
