une 15, 2002, was the first time that a mayor of Cleveland honored a Cleveland Pride demonstration by appearing at the step-off ceremonies and the first time that a rainbow flag has ever flown over the statehouse in honor of the day. Many distinguished speakers addressed the small, umbrellacarrying crowd, the most celebrated being Barney Frank. Of course, the rain dampened everything (except our spirits), and the sound system brought to our ears only a few scattered



words of the no doubt stirring speeches.

Once the parade started, our little party—Jim B., Lynn C., Chuck F., and I—fell into line with Chuck M. and Bob T. and the All Saints group, but we soon left them behind, for Lynn's wheelchair required complicated steering by committee, and it took all of our combined efforts just to stay out of the gutter. Jim pushed the wheelchair while I held the umbrella, moving from side to side as the wind shifted. Lynn, mean-

while, clad in a bright yellow pancho, waved with delight at spectators (yes, there





were five or six spectators), motorists, and the drivers of the floats that we passed in our reckless dash for the finish line.

rations extend nondiscrimination as well as partner benefits to gay and lesbian employees. Please impress upon your fellow Senators that this bill can be bad for business and could deter a company

Thank you for your e-mail regarding House Bill 234, proposing to establish state policy against same-sex marriages, a bill sponsored by State Representative William Seitz. As you are aware, and I have also been informed, this bill is a priority to some Republican House members, however Senator Richard Finan, President of the Ohio

Currently, H.B. 234 has been passed out of the House and has been introduced in the Senate, however it has not been assigned to a committee as of now. I have many reservations with provisions within this bill, and therefore would not vote in favor of this legislation should it reach the floor of the Senate for my consideration. First, I must point out that same-sex marriages are currently not recognized by the Ohio constitution and that no U.S. state allows for same-sex marriage. This bill provides

that Ohio may not recognize other state's unions, however in 1996 the U.S. Congress passed legislation that did just this. Therefore, these provisions in H.B. 234 are unnecessary.

I am also concerned about the constitutionality of this legislation as it attempts to discontinue the rights of the political process to a particular group of people. H.B. 234 also prohibits the Ohio legislature from ever making laws that would afford nonmarital relationships the "specific benefits of marriage." I believe this action is unconstitutional and has been deemed so in previous court cases as a violation of the Equal Protection principal.

Furthermore, as our budget crises still remains and the economic status here in Ohio and nationwide is in flux, I do not believe this should be a priority to the State of Ohio. I personally do not feel it is my position to legislate on the individual liberties of whom people choose to marry.

Again, thank you for expressing your views regarding this legislation, your comments are welcomed and I will take them into consideration as the legislative process continues. Please do not hesitate to contact me with any other questions or concerns in the future.

he Pride Parade in
Toronto brought out
about a million people

according to a television broadcast. A police sergeant said in



an interview that only six arrests were made, at the end



of the parade, for public nudity. The laws of Ontario permit women to show their breasts, and there were plenty of breasts bared, but the number of naked penises in the parade itself could be counted on the fingers of one hand.

The parade lasted a good



two hours and included religious, commercial, and supportive groups (like PFLAG and educational organizations) as well as GLBT groups. The cosmopolitan atmosphere was exhilarating, with the Gay Muslims (see above), Portuguese, South Asians, Pacific



Islanders, Palestinians, Jews, and South Americans.

Since the city's garbage collection agency is now on strike, volunteers went about collecting toonies (two-dollar coins) for cleanup after the parade.

It was gratifying to see so many straight people there, mostly supporting their gay family members (and PFLAG's representation in the parade itself was significant), but there

were also the het couples, girls generally holding boyfriends firmly by the hand. One idyllic couple sat in a grassy corner away from the beer gardens and sound stages. He held her cradled in his arms and legs, his eyes roaming over the sea of flesh before them, while she chatted cheerfully into her cell phone.
