



OPOSSUM

This romantic word can cover any of the edible animals taken in the chase, but, here we have the favorite of all game animals- fried, friccasseed, boiled, broiled or scrambled, it is always a delicacy.

FANNY'S FLAMBEED FRICCASSEED FAVORITE:

If possible, catch and feed opossum milk and cereals for 10 days before killing. Dress 'possum as rabbit (he may get irate when you put the ears on, but, use a soft elastic so it won't hurt his chin). When ready to cook, treat as for pig by immersing the unskinned animal in water just below the boiling point. Test frequently by plucking at the hair. When it slips out readily, remove the 'possum from the water and scrape. Proceed by cutting off head and feet and removing internal organs, plus 2 small sacs found in the small of the back and the glands from each foreleg. Set aside. Remove all fat at once as it turns rancid very quickly. If marinated at least 24 hours in an oil based marinade, all 'possum except the Great snouted, speckled Silver Lift footed, Stripped Tailed Opossum is edible. The best part about gourmet 'possum is that it can be served in such a variety of ways. If you cook up the hairless tail for 3 days with 1 small onion and a large bay leaf and add 1 pound of cheese, you can make an especially nice fondue for your next dinner party.

If you prefer to stuff and bake your 'possum- a white sauce made from the snout is a real topper for any occasion. The stuffing can get an added zing from grinding the feet, heart and organs with motza crumbs and Won Ton to give the dressing more body. To add a really festive touch, leave the feet on 'possum and garnish with a paper frill- a bow tied on the snout is also nice and perhaps a ripe kumquat in his mouth would be a colorful garnish. Roast in a 900 degree oven for 3 days-meat will just fall from the bones and melt in your mouth. Remember our simple reminder- " for external use only".

ELEPHANT STEW

Note: R.V.'ers should be prepared to use any meats available during their travels, even from some remote areas. This recipe will probably not be used often, but can be stored away for instant use when the opportunity presents itself.

1 medium to large elephant salt and pepper to taste plenty of brown gravy 2 rabbits (optional)

Cut elephant into bite size pieces (allow about 2 months to complete this task). Hold trunk aside, you can use it to store pieces during the preparation stage.

Put pieces in large (very large) pot; add enough gravy to cover. Cook over open fire at 450 degrees F. for about 4 weeks, stirring occasionally, until golden brown.

Serves 3,800. If more guests are expected, 2 rabbits may be added. However, this should be done only if absolutely necessary. Most people do not like to find hare in their stew!
