






























It's been almost two years since Marvel Editor-in-Chief Joe Quesada first told me about a little idea called "Planet Hulk." I can't remember Joe's exact phrasing, but I heard the words "Hulk," "battleaxe," and "alien planet." Then my head popped off.

From my first days as a Marvel writer, I'd been hungry to get my hands on the Hulk. I'm a sucker for all the great Marvel characters -- misunderstood heroes whose powers create evocative metaphors and whose foibles lead to genuine, human storytelling. But the Hulk was something special. The metaphor driving the character is as pure and universal as it gets -- who hasn't felt the transforming, terrifying power of anger?

And now my bosses weren't just giving me the Hulk -- they were letting me take him to a savage allen planet for fourteen issues of epic adventure in which the Hulk would become slave, gladiator, rebel, and finally, conquering emperor? Whoe

But what kicked "Planet Hulk" up from super-sweet-gig-l-can't-wait-to-start to unbelievably-awesome-project-that-will-become-my-creative-mission-in-life-for-the-next-year was that we weren't just telling a great soi-fi action story. We were building an emotional epic that confronted the question of whether a person who gives himself over to violent wrath, no matter how justified, is a hero-or a monster.

We love the Hulk because he does what we wish we could do -- when faced with injustice or stupidity, he smashes. That's unacceptable behavior here on Earth. But "Planet Hulk" put our hero on a savage world where his rage and strength were virtues, where he just might find a place, a community, even a queen... But the terrible beauty of the story -- that kernel of truth that great writers from Stan Lee to Bill Mantlo to Peter David have bequeathed us -- is that rage, no matter how justified, always has a price.

By now, you know the price the Hulk pays at the end of "Planet Hulk." And no doubt I'll see you again next month for INCREDIBLE HULK #106 and WORLD WAR HULK #1, wherein we'll find out who pays when the Hulk brings his rage back to Earth.

But first, a few words for the incredible

team that's made "Planet Hulk" possible.

I bow down before Hulk editor extraordinaire Mark Panicia, my constant co-conspirator, with whom I've hatched and nurtured all my crazy ideas. And a tip of the hat to executive editor Tom Brevoort, who's read every script and provided key pointers along the way.

Pencilers Carlo Pagulayan and Aaron Lopresti -- supported by primo inkers Jeffrey Huet and Sandu Florea -masterfully crammed an insane amount of detail, power, and emotion into every panel while designing a slew of new characters and environments that made planet Sakaar fresh and real.

Colorist Chris Sotomayor hatched the brilliant idea that the Hulk should be the only green thing on the planet — with the exception of the eyes of Hulk's future queen, Caiera the Oldstrong.

Assistant Editor Nate Cosby and letterer Randy Gentile put up with multiple tweaks every month as we ensured that every word and every balloon placement were just right.

Cover artist Ladrönn created evocative, textured images that blew all our minds. And all of the guest artists knocked their segments out of the park - kudos to Gary Frank, Alex Nino, Mike Oeming and Marshall Rogers.

Anthony Flamini wrote page after page of the "Planet Hulk Gladiator Guidebook," giving Sakaar a depth and history thoroughly connected with the Marvel Universe.

And of course, many thanks to everyone who's been buying and reading the book. Your enthusiasm has inspired us -- and helped ensure that the Marvel Universe hasn't seen the last of the themes, characters, and world of "Planet Hulk."

Finally, all hail the Eye of Anger. The King of Smash. Two-Hands, Holku, the Green Scar, the Green King --

The Hulk. It's his planet -- we're just visiting.
