The jug read upside down from its base, but what appealed to me most was the figure of "Crushy" with the juice lines running down from his crushed orange, and above him, the words, "Here's How." I have a regular-size soda crowntop bottle with the same embossings, in the same light-green color - so this definitely caught my eye. I bet I went by it a dozen times. The dealer started out with a price of \$700 then reduced it down to \$600 by the end of the show - but at that moment, it was a bit out of my budget, so I had to watch him later pack it back up at the end of the day. During one of my trips by his table, a Crush employee noticed my interest in the jug and said he had only seen one of them before in his life.
